Bivouac paper /magazine which is distributed to the VMC. The Bivouac paper is an excellent source of veteran resources and events scheduled throughout Florida. Because of the statewide exposure, the VMC will run a trial advertisement to hopefully reach out to all of Florida. Check it out if you haven't. DID YOU KNOW, The C-Ration, or Field Ration, Type C, was a prepared and canned wet combat ration intended to be issued to U.S. military land forces when fresh food (A-ration) or packaged unprepared food (B-ration) prepared in mess halls or field kitchens was not possible or not available, and when a survival ration (K-ration or D-ration) was insufficient. Development began in 1938 with the first rations being field-tested in 1940 and wide-scale adoption following soon after. Operational conditions often caused the C-ration to be standardized for field issue regardless of environmental suitability or weight limitations. The C-Ration was replaced in 1958 with the Meal Combat Individual (MCI) Although officially a new ration was derived From the original C-Ration, and in fact continued to be called "C-Rations" by American troops through



out its production life as a combat ration (1958–1980). Although the replacement for the MCI, the MRE, was formally adopted as the Depart ment of Defense combat ration in 1975, the first large-scale production test did not occur until in 1978 with the first MRE I rations packed and de livered in 1981. While the MRE officially replaced the MCI in 1981, previously packed rations continued to be issued until depleted.

We marched 14 miles with the new cadets, and other "old grads" from the Class of 1958 thru the Class of 2021. Despite the precautions taken for COVID-19, they remained upbeat about the rigorous training.

It was an amazing experience to interact with youth who are truly excited about serving our country and becoming the best leaders they can be. Their diversity, camaraderie and team work were on full display – and I for one am happy to report that the development by attrition I experienced as a cadet has been replaced. Their class motto is "Together We Thrive" and it's a great reminder to all of us. I'm glad to serve with all of the volunteers and staff here at the VMC.





A Very Special Tribute to 12 Purple Heart Recipients: 08 August Ceremony at the VMC

For the fourth straight year the Space Coast Chapter of the Military Order of the Purple Heart (MOPH) held a ceremony to recognize a record number of PH recipients (12) in front of a record crowd (160). Many of the honorees and readers for the stories were Veterans Memorial Center (VMC) and/or Cape Canaveral Chapter of MOAA members.

The Space Coast MOPH Chapter is commanded by Carl Miller and calls the VMC its home. The program included the colors being presented by the Space Coast Young Marines, also often working out of VMC. Many people assisted Carl Miller in making this a great event with a fantastic printed program, but Brevard Marine Corps League Commandant, Vinnie Howard with his extensive set up work and coordinating the Color Guard with SCYM Commander Brian Delaney, deserve special recognition.

Each honoree story of how they received their Purple Heart(s) was read aloud while the twelve 8x8 in bricks were displayed on a table in the front of Gray Hall at the VMC. The honorees were:

Brian McGinnis (KIA in Iraq 2003); Jonathan Langford; Thomas Trotter; Joshua Frey; Danny Mc Knight; John Erskine; Ray Lynch; Charles Donovan; Adrian Ayala; Mike Lomax; Juan Santiago and Carl Miller.

Their bricks have been installed in the VMC Memorial Plaza around the Purple Heart Monument in honored recognition of their service and sacrifice for our country.

Local Sports Stadium and Organization Provides Special Support to Veterans

In early May this year, a few veterans approached Bob Grey, Strategic Partner and Manager of the United States Specialty Sports of America (USSSA) at Space Coast Stadium in Viera and his great team with a request.

Only days earlier a well known former Brevard County ROTC and JROTC Instructor and retired US Army Ranger, MSG Mike Sonnenschien, had been nearly fatally shot while serving on a religious mission to Haiti, a country in major turmoil through this time. Ranger Mike needed financial assistance to help with air evacuation and recovery since he had given up most everything to pursue his mission through a local Viera Church. LTC Tim Thomas, USA Ret and Vice Mayor of Melbourne as well as Viera HS JROTC Army Instructor led the Ranger Mike Fund effort while Brevard Veterans Council Chairman Donn Weaver worked with the Veterans Memorial Center and other groups in support.

Listening carefully, Grey suggested there was a date on May 22 where a fundraiser could be held at Space Coast Stadium. Over the next week he worked with the veterans to add additional fundraising opportunities at the July 2 USSSA Pride Fast Pitch Softball Game Military and Veteran Appreciation Night. Finally he decided that proceeds from a month long on line auction of sports jerseys provided by local sports personalities could also be added to the effort.

Together these event added over 90 per cent of the \$22,000 raised to provide to Ranger Mike and his family. In addition, the July 2 game, attended by nearly 2000, recognized three WWII and Korean War Vets as well as all military and veterans in attendance, which was a great and patriotic way to kick off one of the best Fourth of July weekends in the history of Brevard County.

During the summer the Bob Grey and his team also included at no cost a full page ad in their program for 2021 about the partnership now established with the Veterans Memorial Center (VMC). The Good Deeds Foundation of the Cape Canaveral Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAACC) worked with USSSA and the VMC to create and advertise the Ranger Mike Fund which enabled all donations to be tax deductible.





The VMC supports many veterans, teaches Americans about what veterans have done for our country and has many other missions together with the county. VMC charges nothing for its museum and other facilities for regular visits.

Success breeds new ideas. The USSSA is now working with the VMC and MOAACC to organize another special night for veterans and active duty military during a late September national softball tournament. Book Report

Ambushed under the Southern Cross: The making of an American Merchant Marine Officer and his Ensuing Saga of Courage and Survival by Capt. George W. Duffy

This book jacket has an interesting title lead...Ambushed gets one's attention. There is a phantom outline of a maritime ship. One would think of swashbucklers, treasure on a Caribbean Island. ...not quite. This saga unfolds with a story about George Duffy and his twenty-five classmates who graduated from the Massachusetts Nautical School (MNS) in 1941. Their class made the summer training cruises under sail and ended an era that began in 1891 with the MNS. These young sailors of 18-20 years old were recruited as deck and engineering officers in the US merchant marine.


Within a year of graduating and ten months into WWII Duffy's good fortune came to an abrupt end when his ship the American Leader was sunk by a German disguised raider. It was a warship with deck cannons, etc. they attacked and sunk the American Leader. Duffy and his 46 shipmates were rescued from the South Atlantic and taken prisoner by the Germans. George had two spartan years in the Nantucket and a rewarding year in the American Leader until she was sunk. After rescue by the German warship, he was sent to southern Pacific and spent four years in ten Japanese prison camps scattered over the southeast Asian island of Java, Singapore, and Sumatra. Picture the movie "Bridge over the River Qui" in all of its brutality, starvation, and death. Perhaps Duffy's experience was the model for the movie.

The antithesis for Duffy is that of a young German naval officer Konrad Hoppe who was an officer on the Hsk Miche. Many years after the war Hoppe and Duffy met and became good friends. Several pages are devoted to the acquaintance of these two mariners after the war. The website http://www.usmm.org lists 1554 ships (733 over 1000 gross tons) that were sunk during WWII. Crewman lost was 9521 out of 243000 or about 4% loss. My father told me of many nights of fear of German U-boats in the Caribbean as his ship traversed the Florida straits .In the 60s as a novice scuba diver our club dove on a Russian freighter 12 miles south of Pensacola...mostly flat plates but enough to attract barracudas and a few bottom fish....one of those who did not make it home.—Duffy and his wife Margaret reside in New Hampshire.




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Museum Report

Visit the Museum at the Veterans Memorial Center, where history never gets old.



Keeping with this months feature of the Vietnam War, the museum has much to offer to make your visit educational.

Vietnam Tet Offensive of 1968

On January 30, 1968, communist-affiliated troops from North Vietnam and the Viet Cong (a distinct political organization) launched what became known as the Tet Offensive against South Vietnam and its American allies. The Tet Offensive was one of the largest military operations of the Vietnam War, and became a key turning point in the conflict.

The Tet Offensive was a surprise series of attacks launched during Tet, the Vietnamese New Year festival. Many South Vietnamese troops were on holiday when the attacks began, and the military was caught off guard. The campaign initially targeted more than 100 cities and towns, including the strategic southern capital of Saigon, now named Ho Chi Minh City.



The Tet Offensive was a catastrophic military failure for the communists. Historians estimate as many as 50,000 communist troops died in the effort to gain control of the southern part of the country. The South Vietnamese and American losses totaled a fraction of that number.

Although a military loss, the Tet Offensive was a stunning propaganda victory for the communists. In fact, it is often credited with turning the war in their favor. The South Vietnamese began to lose influence as Viet Cong guerrillas infiltrated rural areas formerly held by the South Vietnamese government. The offensive frayed the relationship between the South Vietnamese and the United States. The consequences of the Tet Offensive extended to the United States.

Many Americans began to question military and political leaders who assured them the Vietnam War would be won soon. In the wake of the Tet Offensive, popular U.S. journalist Walter Cronkite said, "We are mired in a stalemate [and] the only rational way out, then, will be to negotiate, not as victors, but as an honorable people who lived up to their pledge to defend democracy and did the best they could."



The Battle of Khe Sanh began on January 21, 1968, when forces from the People's Army of North Vietnam (PAVN) carried out a massive artillery bombardment on the U.S. Marine garrison at Khe Sanh, located in South Vietnam near the border with Laos. For the next 77 days, U.S. Marines and their South Vietnamese allies fought off an intense siege of the garrison, one of the longest and bloodiest battles of the Vietnam War.

Defending Khe Sanh

The U.S. military presence at Khe Sanh began in 1962, when Army Special Forces built a small camp near the village, located some 14 miles south of the demilitarized zone (DMZ) between North and South Vietnam and 6 miles from the Laotian border on Route 9, the principal road from South Vietnam into Laos.

U.S. Marines built a garrison adjacent to the Army camp in 1966. In the fall of 1967, the People's Army of North Vietnam (PAVN) began to build up its strength in the region, and U.S. officials began to suspect that Khe Sanh would be the target of an attack Did you know? The number of Communist forces killed in the Battle of Khe Sanh would reach around 10,000, compared to fewer than 500 U.S. Marines killed in action. General William Westmoreland, commander of the U.S. Military Assistance Command in Vietnam (MACV), believed that Vietnamese Communist forces had targeted Khe Sanh as part of a general effort to seize South Vietnam's northernmost regions and put themselves in a stronger position prior to any future peace negotiations. They had done this successfully against French colonial troops at the Battle of Dien Bien Phu in 1954, prior to obtaining independence at the Geneva peace conference. As part of a program codenamed Operation Scotland, Westmoreland reinforced the Marine garrison at Khe Sanh—bringing the total number of troops to around 6,000—stockpiled ammunition and refurbished the airstrip at the base, all in preparation for a possible attack.

Battle of Khe Sanh

The attack finally came on January 21, 1968, when PAVN forces began a massive artillery bombardment of Khe Sanh, hitting the base's main store of ammunition and destroying 90 percent of its artillery and mortar rounds.

President Lyndon B. Johnson agreed with Westmoreland's argument that the base should be held at all costs, and U.S. and South Vietnamese forces launched Operation Niagara, a major artillery bombardment of suspected locations of North Vietnamese artillery in the hills surrounding Khe Sanh. As Johnson, Westmoreland and other officials considered Khe Sanh to be the primary target of the North Vietnamese, they largely ignored signs of a Communist buildup in more urban areas of South Vietnam.

The Tet Offensive

This proved to be a mistake, as on January 31, 1968—a date celebrated as the lunar new year, or Tet—some 70,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces launched a coordinated series of fierce attacks on more than 100 cities and towns in South Vietnam. Known as the Tet Offensive, this aggressive operation aimed to break Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) forces, inspire rebellion among the South Vietnamese population against the regime in Saigon and drive a wedge between South Vietnam and its powerful ally, the United States. Suddenly, the long and bitter struggle at Khe Sanh began to look like a diversionary tactic meant to tie up U.S. and South Vietnamese resources leading up to the Tet Offensive.

Impact of Khe Sanh

News reports of the Battle of Khe Sanh consistently referred to the struggle as another Dien Bien Phu, but in reality the U.S. and South Vietnamese enjoyed a much stronger position than had the French.

In addition to a fleet of helicopters and cargo planes that could resupply and reinforce the besieged Marines, they could rely on the heavy bombing capacity of the B-52 fighter planes, which dropped close to 100,000 explosives on the hills surrounding Khe Sanh over the course of the battle.


Though U.S. officials expected a full-scale attack by North Vietnamese forces on the base, it never came, and in March Westmoreland ordered Operation Pegasus, a joint Army, Marine and ARVN ground advance that relieved the base and ended the siege by mid-April, after some 77 days.

Critics Attack U.S. War Effort

In the face of criticism that he had fallen victim to the North Vietnamese diversionary tactic, Westmoreland defended his decision to defend Khe Sanh, and claimed the battle as a victory in that it prevented the enemy from gaining control over the northwest corner of South Vietnam and inflicted heavy losses on PAVN forces. As antiwar sentiment mounted on the home front in the wake of the Tet Offensive, the Johnson administration lost confidence in the general's strategy of attrition and his claims of progress in the war effort. On March 31, Johnson announced he was halting most of the bombing attacks in North Vietnam and opening peace negotiations; he also withdrew his candidacy for reelection. General Creighton W. Abrams replaced Westmoreland as MACV head in June 1968, and on July 5 he closed the U.S. Marine base at Khe Sanh.

What the HO CHI MINH TRAIL" looks like today

The Ho Chi Minh Trail was a military supply route running from North Vietnam through Laos and Cambodia to South Vietnam. The route sent weapons, manpower, ammunition and other supplies from communist-led North Vietnam to their supporters in South Vietnam

VA Burial Benefits / National Cemetery

Questions about the Veterans Affairs Burial Benefit Program for the National Cemetery? VA burial benefits can help service members, Veterans, and their family members plan and pay for a burial or memorial service in a VA national cemetery. Family members can also order memorial items to honor the service of a Veteran. Find out how to apply for the burial benefits you've earned.

Eligibility Requirements

- You paid for a Veteran's burial or funeral, AND
- You have not been reimbursed by another government agency or some other source, such as the deceased
 Veteran's employer, AND
- The Veteran was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, AND
- The Veteran died because of a service-related disability, OR
- The Veteran was receiving VA pension or compensation at the time of death, OR
- The Veteran was entitled to receive VA pension or compensation, but decided not to reduce his/her military retirement or disability pay, OR
- The Veteran died while hospitalized by VA, or while receiving care under VA contract at a non-VA facility, OR
- The Veteran died while traveling under proper authorization and at VA expense to or from a specified place for the purpose of examination, treatment, or care, OR
- The Veteran had an original or reopened claim pending at the time of death and has been found entitled to compensation or pension from a date prior to the date or death, OR
- The Veteran died on or after October 9, 1996, while a patient at a VA-approved state nursing home.

NOTE: VA does not pay burial benefits if the deceased:

Died during active military service, OR

Was a member of Congress who died while holding office, OR Was a Federal prisoner

Service-related Death

VA burial benefits include:

A gravesite in any of the <u>national cemeteries</u> with available space

- Opening and closing of the grave
- A burial liner provided by the government.

A <u>headstone or marker</u> provided by the government Perpetual (ongoing) care of the gravesite

At the time of need, the person planning the burial can also request other <u>VA memorial items</u> as well as <u>military</u> <u>funeral honors</u> provided by the Department of Defense. These items and honors have other eligibility requirements.

VA will pay up to \$2,000 toward burial expenses for deaths on or after September 11, 2001, or up to \$1,500 for deaths prior to September 11, 2001. If the Veteran is buried in a VA national cemetery, some or all of the cost of transporting the deceased may be reimbursed.

Non-service-related Death

VA will pay up to \$796 toward burial and funeral expenses for deaths on or after October 1, 2019 (if hospitalized by VA at time of death), or \$300 toward burial and funeral expenses (if not hospitalized by VA at time of death), and a \$796 plot-interment allowance (if not buried in a national cemetery). For deaths on or after December 1, 2001, but before October 1, 2011, VA will pay up to \$300 toward burial and funeral expenses and a \$300 plot-interment allowance. For deaths on or after April 1, 1988 but before October 1, 2011, VA will pay \$300 toward burial and funeral expenses (for Veterans hospitalized by VA at the time of death).

An annual increase in burial and plot allowances for deaths occurring after October 1, 2011 began in fiscal year 2013 based on the Consumer Price Index for the preceding 12-month period.

Evidence Requirements

Acceptable proof of death as specified in 38 CFR 3.211., AND

- Receipted bills that show that you made payment in whole or part, OR
- A statement of account, preferably on the printed billhead of the funeral director or cemetery owner. The statement of account must show:
- . The name of the deceased Veteran for whom the services and merchandise were furnished, AND
- The nature and cost of the services and merchandise, AND
- All credits, AND

The amount of the unpaid balance, if any

What does burial in a VA national cemetery include?

When a Veteran, service member, or family member qualifies for burial in a VA national cemetery, they receive certain burial benefits at no cost to their family.

You may also go to your local regional benefit office and turn in your application for processing.


