March was a fairly busy month with the annual Last Naval Battle of the Revolution on Saturday, March 18 and preparations and planning for many more events in the coming months.

We have also added a projector and screen for events that meet in the Library. The Library is hosting a speaker on 25 April with the first of many in a Library Discussion Series. This first event covers the "Turning Point of the Revolutionary War: The Battle of Saratoga."

I unfortunately missed the LNB because I was on a 7-day cruise on the Royal Caribbean's Wonder of the Seas. If you get a chance, sail on this ship out of the port. # New Veterans History Project Interview: Doug Bisset



Doug Bisset is a Vietnam era veteran who served in the Army Reserves from 1970 to 1975. Doug entered the Army ROTC program at Lafayette college in Easton, PA. After attending the US Army Transportation School at Ft. Eustis, VA, 1Lt. Bissett was sent to Inchon, Korea to handle unloading ships and moving equipment inland. Inchon has very high tides, so heavy equipment and additional boats were needed to move equipment through locks.

In his interview, Doug is wearing the same fatigue uniform that he wore as a 24-year-old in charge of transportation. We can still make out the US Army stripe above his left pocket, however, the Bisset name stripe is faded out above his right pocket. During his interview he holds up several photos that explain what transportation is all about in Korea. One of the photos is of himself in the same uniform in the same fatigues.

Doug is one of our library volunteers and very active in our VMC outreach to local School ROTC programs.

# Chaplain's Corner

Not all wounds from war are visible. Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) can be just as serious and painful as a gunshot. A diagnosis of PTSD requires exposure to an upsetting traumatic event, including directly experiencing an event, witnessing a traumatic event happening to others, or learning that a traumatic event happened to a close family member or friend. It can also occur as a result of repeated exposure to horrible details of trauma, when such as police officers are exposed to details of child abuse.

## Symptoms and Diagnosis

Symptoms of PTSD fall into the following four categories.\* Specific symptoms can vary in severity.

Intrusion: Intrusive thoughts such as repeated, involuntary memories; distressing dreams; or flashbacks of the traumatic event. Flashbacks may be so vivid that people feel they are reliving the traumatic experience or seeing it before their eyes.

Avoidance: Avoiding reminders of the traumatic event may include avoiding people, places, activities, objects, and situations that may trigger distressing memories. People may try to avoid remembering or thinking about the traumatic event. They may resist talking about what happened or how they feel about it.

Alterations in cognition and mood: Inability to remember important aspects of the traumatic event, negative thoughts and feelings leading to ongoing and distorted beliefs about oneself or others (e.g., "I am bad," "No one can be trusted"); distorted thoughts about the cause or consequences of the event leading to wrongly blaming self or other; ongoing fear, horror, anger, guilt or shame; much less interest in activities previously enjoyed; feeling detached or estranged from others; or being unable to experience positive emotions (a void of happiness or satisfaction).

Alterations in arousal and reactivity: Arousal and reactive symptoms may include being irritable and having angry outbursts; behaving recklessly or in a self-destructive way; being overly watchful of one's surroundings in a suspecting way; being easily startled; or having problems concentrating or sleeping.

Many people who are exposed to a traumatic event experience symptoms similar to those described above in the days following the event. For a person to be diagnosed with PTSD, however, symptoms must last for more than a month and must cause significant distress or problems in the individual's daily functioning. Many individuals develop symptoms within three months of the trauma, but symptoms may appear later and often persist for months and sometimes years. PTSD often occurs with other related conditions, such as depression, substance use, memory problems, and other physical and mental health problems.

# Remembering the Last Naval Battle: 240 Years Later

The history that established our community is always worth remembering and we are grateful local organizations continue to keep our history alive.

he Brevard Veterans Memorial Center was the scene on March 18th for the annual ceremony to remember and teach about the Last Naval Battle of the American Revolutionary War fought off the coast of Cape Canaveral.

Sponsored by the Brevard chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), the six Space Coast chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), the Good Deeds Foundation of the Cape Canaveral Chapter of the Military Officers Association (GDF/MOAACC), and the Veterans Memorial Center (VMC), the event was exceptionally covered by the media (Florida Today, Space Coast Daily, Senior Sscene and others). The well attended ceremony was witnessed by over 220 people, including SAR and DAR participants from six states.

The event was informative and festive, the highlight of dedicating the first "250 Patriot Marker" in Florida by the Regent of DAR for Florida, Cynthia Anderson, and the Space Coast Council Past Regent, Lona Burnett. The monument remembers the descendants and patriots who have supported America since the Revolution in advance of America's 250th Anniversary on July 4, 2026. The Naval Ordnance Test Unit (NOTU) from Port Canaveral were major participants with their Color Guard, Commanding Officer CAPT Jason Schneider as keynote Speaker and their Ceremonial Submarine Deck Guns which fired off a 21 gun salute at the end of the ceremony.

Joel Etherton, President of the Brevard SAR Chapter, was master of ceremonies. More than 70 participants joined the Parade of Flags, wreath laying and photos around the new monument in the VMC Memorial Plaza in colonial era dress—quite a visual history lesson in itself.

The first Last Naval Battle Ceremony was at Port Canaveral in 2007. In 2015, when the LNB monument and Cannon Replica were moved to the VMC, the ceremony moved with it. It was even held in March of 2020, just days before the Covid 19 "Stay at Home" directives took effect.

# District JROTC Championship Drill Meet at Veterans Memorial Park

On 04 March, seven Brevard Army JROTC Programs fielded teams for the District Championship at Veterans Memorial Park. Two earlier meets had more schools and cadets competing, but scores earned at previous did not allow others to attend the selective district meet.

Following through on a pledge made early this school year, the Good Deeds Foundation of MOAACC provided funds for every trophy at all eight meets from September to March for the 15 JROTC High Schools competing in Raider Challenges, Air Rifle and Drill meets. The \$3400+ in funds included money for a new, GDF perpetual trophy to recognize the annual winner of the drill competition, named after MOAACC member Lloyd Stafford, a Texas A&M graduate who provided his Aggie Sabre as part of the trophy. GDF member Doug Bisset created the new trophy which was presented at the final JRTOC drill meet for the 2022-23 School Year. The meet was also supported by the VMC.

Cocoa Beach Jr/Sr Army JROTC Drill Team won the GDF trophy for 2023. They, and most of the six other JROTC programs (Cocoa, Rockledge, Heritage, Viera, Astronaut and Merritt Island), placed seven separate teams that won first place in categories ranging from Color Guard to Platoon Armed Drill to individual demonstration. Those seven teams are headed for state competition in late March. Congratulations to all the 120 JROTC cadets who competed--when most of their high school classmates were at home in bed on a beautiful Saturday morning.

Of special note was the Drill Team from Cocoa Army JROTC. Three nights before the meet, one of their own, Cadet Kiara Terwilliger was killed at her home in Cocoa. The team decided to compete in her honor, and performed quite well. A moment of silence was held in memory of Ms. Terwilliger as the Cocoa team and supporters released balloons into the air.

Parents, cadets and instructors heartily thanked MOAACC and VMC for support at all meets held at the VMC Park this season1. It was quite a school year for so many JROTC cadets and teams.

# Did you know...?

The Women's Army Corps (WAC) was the women's branch of the United States Army. It was created as an auxiliary unit, the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC) on 15 May 1942, and converted to an active duty status in the Army of the United States as the WAC on 1 July 1943. However, the Army actually needed women to free soldiers for combat duty overseas. So despite all rejections the Congress established the Women Army Auxiliary Corps on 14 May 1942 by Public Law (PL) No.77-544.

The law passed with a slight majority of 11 votes. The demand of a military status was too progressive to find consent. Just an auxiliary organization with the immediate strength of 25,000 women was authorized, with an ultimate strength of 150,000 when needed. Its first director was Oveta Culp Hobby, a prominent woman in Texas society. The WAC was disbanded in 1978, and all units were integrated with male units.

# **Book Report**

# Woman in Wartime London: The Dairy of Kathleen Tipper 1941-1945 Report by Raymond Norman



So, there I was, an 8 year old kid in the back seat of an old car, scared because my Mom had just left me alone after setting the hand brake on the old jalopy. We were on a hill in Birmingham, AL.

It was late. It was dark...very dark! Black out conditions in WWII. We ran out of gas...ration coupons? What is an eight-year-old

kid know about coupons...I had just started grade school. ... it was cold and I was alone. I was scared! Mom had to take the one gallon can and walk down th 20th street hill to a gas station to get just enough gas to ge us home...she did...we did.

Kathleen Tipper, the author of *Woman in Wartime London*, had similar experiences during WWII even though we were an ocean apart. (She was a little older than I.) She was in London, UK, where it was also cold, also very wet or snowy....or wet and snowy. The UK had to contend with V-1 bombs and later V-2s. The V-1s were not that bad unless you heard the motor stop, then...lookout.

Kathleen's job was volunteering with the YMCA, which she referred to as YM. Her somewhat detailed story is described in the book, truncated in several places for readability. The description of the London area geography is worth remembering if you have been there.

The author served the various military personnel from several countries and does a good job relating the events for the reader. There was a program to record your individual experiences called "Mass Observation" and Kathleen took part from 1941 until the war was over. She records the activities in fog (really bad fog), driving a lorry, etc. A quick read...editors truncated the diary well. Hope you enjoy.

# Park and Plaza Report

March was another big month for our Memorial Plaza and Park. The Plaza saw major upgrades on many old benches, repainting of another series of historical timeline in ground stone markers, 17 new brick donations and great improvement thanks to Wayne Fried in our memorial brick online log in system. We hope the latter will eventually mean visitors can enter the dedicated name for any brick and quickly confirm it exists in our plaza and exactly where it is - a far cry from hit and miss handwritten systems over the last 20 years.

The plaza was also the scene of the dedication of the first "Patriot 250" by the National Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) during the Last Naval Battle of the Revolutionary War Ceremony. See the full story on the event, but you can see pictured on the right the new marker. It is located in the plaza right near the LNB nationally recognized landmark and replica cannon.

The Veterans Memorial Park was the scene of the final JROTC event of the 2022-23 school year — the District Drill Meet as well many special events ranging from birthday parties to Crawfish Cookouts and Jeep Club's annual vehicles blessing event. On many days, especially during March Spring Break, dozens of kids and their parents can be found at the new VMP

It's Tax time and scammers are at their peak operating time. However, it's more than your or should I say our taxes their after. The fraud watchers at AARP are warning us that a crime called "check washing" is on the rise across the country. This is how the thief uses this low-tech "check washing" procedure that almost anyone can do. The bad guy(s) steal the checks you place in the mailbox for the mailman to pick up. Then they use bleach or acetone (used as nail polish remover) they erase the payee's name and the amount of the check, leaving the signature intact. After drying, the checks are rewritten for more money and deposited or cashed at a bank, check cashing businesses that offer check-cashing services. The washed checks look perfect.

Check washing is soaring because the bad guy(s) who stole government stimulus and unemployment checks during the pandemic are now looking for new sources of income. Many people do not realize their checks have the routing number and their checking account number on them which can lead to more grief. The size of their bank account may be revealed so the bad guy(s) know how much they can withdraw.

Do not put your mail with checks in them on your mailbox for your post man to pick up! This is a bad practice! Take them to your post office and use an inside mail drop box. Use a pen with blue or black non-erasable gel ink to complete the checks. This soaks into the paper and will prove more difficult to remove. Do not let delivered mail sit in your mailbox. This is an easy crime to prevent!

## **More Scam News**

March 9, 2023, was National Slam the Scam Day and was created to focus on raising awareness to avoid fraud and scans. I received an email the other day about confirming for a USPS package delivery. The email said there was some postage due of \$1.96 on the package. I decided to open it and see what the scam was up to. The first couple of clicks wanted my name and address. The Red Flags went up! If they had a package to deliver to me why do they need my name and address? Don't they already have

it on the package? Then we got to the meat of the issue. They wanted my credit card number and information to make sure the postage due of \$1.96 on the package was paid before delivery. A big Red Flag on this one!!! Having worked for the U.S. Postal Service I knew they do not deliver "Postage Due" mail. It will always be Return to Sender (RTS, or Finger Mail as we called it because it was stamped with a finger pointing toward the return address) for insufficient postage. At this point I opted out and deleted the mail.

We have become bombarded with this type of phishing mail. Know this: when it comes to Social Security and other government agencies they will never:

- Call you unsolicited to suspend your Social Security number or tell you about crime(s) committed in your name or offer to resolve identity theft or a benefit problem in exchange for payment.
- Insist you pay fines, fees, or debts immediately with retail gift cards, pre-paid debit cards, wire transfers, internet currency, or by mailing cash.
- Insist on secrecy about a legal problem or tell you to make up stories to tell family, friends, or store employees.

#### The Federal Trade Commission Offers Theses Clues That Someone Has Stolen Your Information

- You see withdrawals from your bank account that you can't explain.
- You don't get your bills or other mail.
- Merchants refuse your checks.

- Debt collectors call you about debts that aren't yours.
- You find unfamiliar accounts or charges on your credit report.
- Medical providers bill you for services you didn't use.
- Your health plan rejects your legitimate medical claim because the records show you've reached your benefits limit.
- A health plan won't cover you because your medical records show a condition you don't have.
- The IRS notifies you that more than one tax return was filed in your name, or that you have income from an employer you don't work for.
- You get notice that your information was compromised by a data breach at a company where you do business or have an account.
