Elections

The VMC and BVC Board also recommended trying to fill the Vice President and Vice Chairman positions with other than the President and Chairman being each other's Vice as was done for at least 20 years. Other Updates

There were some other good news items in May:

- We nearly completed our numerous upgrades using the BCSO funds, the results of which can be seen all over.

- The State approved the \$1M for Amphitheater and Park Infrastructure cost increases as we await the Governor's signature; they reported groundbreaking on some aspects this summer and on the amphitheater by September.

Will leave some comments reflecting on the end of my 10 years in VMC leadership positions, with thanks to so many, until July when our new officers and Board will be sworn in. But, as Past Chair on the Board for another year, I promise to support a smooth transition.

Looking forward to many summer events, especially the BCSO/ VMC July 4th Parade and Purple Heart Ceremony on 06 August as the pace at VMC never really slows down.

The VMC Memorial Day Ceremony attended by about 400 on 29 May capped an amazing weekend. The event, like all others which began on Friday, 26 May, was well covered in the media including some on TV. The Space Coast Live broadcasts are still available on the net.

The weekend began Friday morning at Erdman Motors in Cocoa when four great speakers spoke about the meaning of Memorial Day, including VMC President Dean Schaaf. All were generously presented \$2500 checks for their organizations by Erdman Motors.

That evening saw VMC host an emotional but wonderful dinner for 38 Gold Star Families. The event was sponsored by Rolling Thunder FL Chapter 1 (RT) as the kickoff for Ride for Freedom Weekend. Dorothy Walsh Pearsall and Don Pearsall planned the event with help from Rolling Thunder and American Legion 344 Aux.

Day two was postponed due to weather but saw the arrival of the moving Vietnam and Global War on Terror Wall. The wall was provided by the Patriot Guard Riders of Central Florida and was the backdrop of a moving Flame Ceremony through

to monuments in the Memorial Plaza to the walls. More than 150 attended that event in the evening as Golf Star families lit a candle from the flame and said aloud the name of the fallen loved one.

Sunday, 28 May was special as 600 motorcycles and riders, including twelve from Holland, roared out of the VMC/Mall parking lots as a B52H Air Force bomber flew overhead. (Those aircraft in Vietnam began the term "Rolling Thunder.")

In addition to six other events in Brevard on Memorial Day itself, the VMC ceremony was not only well attended but received many positive comments.

The Dutch riders joined 40 Rolling Thunder members to place a wreath at the Fallen Allies Memorial in the VMC Plaza before the program. Dean Schaaf and Council Chair Donn



Chaplain's Corner by Chaplain Chip Hanson USMC (Fmr)



ften referred to as "addiction," substance use disorder (SUD) is a disease that causes people to have difficulty controlling their use of alcohol, drugs, and other substances, including opioids. Untreated, this misuse can begin to influence many aspects of life.

Substance Abuse in Veterans

Over one in ten US veterans have been diagnosed with SUD, and deployment is associated with risky behaviors and unhealthy behaviors like smoking, drinking, and drug use. After service, veterans are more susceptible to alcohol use (56%), with 7.5% heavily drinking or binge drinking. Around 30% smoke tobacco or vape. The period of readjustment and the stress of trying to reintegrate back into normal life, Substance Abuse in Veterans along with suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder and other issues due to relocation, deployment, and lack of sufficient support when returning home are all factors in veterans drug abuse statistics as well.

Management of this significant problem among our nation's military veterans varies. Among psychotherapeutic approaches, behavioral interventions for the management of SUDs typically involve short-term, cognitive-behavioral therapy interventions. These interventions focus on the identification and modification of maladaptive thoughts and behaviors associated with increased craving, use, or relapse to substances. Additionally, client-centered motivational interviewing approaches focus on increasing motivation to engage in treatment and reduce substance use. A variety of pharmacotherapies have received some support in the management of SUDs, primarily to help with the reduction of craving or withdrawal symptoms.

Signs and Symptoms of SUD

- Increased urge to drink or to use drugs.
- Inability to stop drinking or using drugs.
- Drinking or using drugs in hazardous situations (e.g., drinking and driving).
- Change in relationships due to drinking or drug use.
- Feeling depressed or anxious about your substance use.
- Feeling sick and experiencing withdrawal symptoms when drinking or drug use stops.
- Increased tolerance, refers to the need over time for more alcohol or stronger drugs to achieve the desired effect.


The RTFL-1 Chapter, home based at the Veterans Memorial Center, decided immediately to make sure JJ would not be forgotten. Among their actions was a memorial brick in the VMC Plaza and purchasing a Memorial Park Bench Honoring him. The bench came in record time and will be installed later in a permeant place chosen by Dreama and RTFL-1, now led by President Lance Armstrong.



The bench was unveiled at the 21 May RTFL-1 meeting and for now sits just outside the main entrance of the VMC where JJ frequently visited for Board Meetings, RTFL-1 meetings, special events and more. Rest in honored peace and know you are remembered, soldier!!

Book Report

The Long Arm of America by Martin Caidin, Catalog # JMA-017 Report by Raymond Norman



The Long Arm of America is something of a historical review of the creation of the famed Lockheed C-130. The 130 was the "go to" short takeoff and landing Air Force carrier that hauled everything troops and equipment. It wasand still is... as historical as the DC-3 "Gooney" bird of WWII fame. The 130's first flight was in

1954. Since that time the C-130 became the fifth aircraft to mark 60 years of continuous service with its original primary customer - the US Air Force. The 130 is now being produced as the Lockheed Martin C-130 Super Hercules. A historical development from the WWII Chase XCG-20 Avitruc designed as a cargo glider in 1947 has proceeded to the Boeing C097 Stratofreighter which has rear ramps for

vehicle drive on. The range for the plane was 1270 miles and could and still does operate from short unprepared strips and snow paths in the Arctic and Antarctic.

The 141 however, is still going strong and some of the readers will have been crew or passenger on this aircraft which was manufactured in Georgia...just north of Atlanta in Marietta. Combining the jet engine with propellers was a new deal when the plane was developed...a boxy odd-looking creature. It became the master of the short takeoff and landings in rough terrain. A quick Google search indicates that the majority of the whole world nations have used the plane in their military, rescue and commercial air activity. The book is an older version of Caidin's work and worn a bit but the data, even the black and white photos and drawings are descriptive. This book is a welcome background for aviation historians. Please note that a short review for the Courier does not do the aircraft justice and a Google search will lead you to some outstanding narratives including a Carrier landing.... if you can believe that!!

Park and Plaza Report

Even though it is called a Medicare Flex Card, this prepaid debit card is issued by Medicare Advantage plans, not the U.S. government. It's offered through some, not all, private Medicare Advantage plans to help pay for specific expenses, such as over-the-counter (OTC) medications, a grocery allowance for healthy food purchases, and copayments for dental, hearing and vision care.

The stand-alone card is different than your Medicare card or health insurance card from Medicare Advantage, Medigap or another health plan.

What Can I Use a Medicare Flex Card for?

While their use varies by Medicare Advantage plan, flex cards typically contain quarterly or annual allowances for OTC medications, drugstore items, healthy food, meal delivery, transportation, and other extra benefits. According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, 87 percent of Medicare Advantage plans cover OTC drugs and 71 percent provide a meal benefit in 2023.

Almost all Medicare Advantage plans provide some coverage for dental, hearing and vision care, while some plans use flex cards to cover copayments or certain eligible expenses with an annual dollar limit, such as \$225 for eyeglasses and contact lenses.

How Does a Medicare Flex Card Work?

Like prepaid debit cards, flex cards are loaded with a predetermined amount to cover expenses within a specified time. But they also come with rules on what the money can be used for. You may be able to use your flex card for OTC medications at certain pharmacies, for eyeglasses and contact lenses at select optical centers, or for copays with in-network dentists. Find out from your plan about requirements for using the card. If you receive a quarterly allowance for OTC medicine and other drugstore items, say, \$50 a quarter, scan the flex card at checkout; the money will automatically be applied to eligible items. Some flex cards work with online purchases too.



Contact the DAV for assistance in filing claims, reviewing information or for questions regarding the PACT Act.

Some Medicare Advantage plans offer flex cards only to certain members, such as those with chronic conditions. In 2020, Medicare Advantage plans began offering chronically ill patients special supplemental benefits that aren't directly tied to medicine, such as food and produce, meal delivery and nonmedical transportation. But you need to qualify for these benefits. They're not available to all members.

Keep in mind...

The flex card is one of many benefits to consider when deciding between original Medicare and Medicare Advantage. When choosing a Medicare Advantage plan, compare how the plan covers your regular medical expenses and medications, as well as its coverage for major medical issues. And find out whether the plan's provider network covers the doctors and hospitals you want to use. Beware of flex card scams if someone claims to be from Medicare offering one of these cards. It could be an ID thief trying to steal your personal information.

Veterans in Suicidal Crisis Can Go to Any VA or Non-VA Health Care Facility for Free Emergency Health Care

WASHINGTON – Starting Jan. 17, Veterans in acute suicidal crisis will be able to go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for emergency health care at no

cost – including inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days and outpatient care for up to 90 days. Veterans do not need to be enrolled in the VA system to use this benefit.

This expansion of care will help prevent Veteran suicide by guaranteeing no cost, world-class care to Veterans in times of crisis. It will also increase access to acute suicide care for up to 9 million Veterans who are not currently enrolled in VA.

Preventing Veteran suicide is VA's top clinical priority and a top priority of the Biden-Harris Administration. This effort is a key part of VA's 10-year National Strategy for Preventing Veteran Suicide and the Biden-Harris administration's plan for Reducing Military and Veteran Suicide. In September, VA released the 2022 National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report, which showed that Veteran suicides decreased in 2020 for the second year in a row, and that fewer Veterans died by suicide in 2020 than in any year since 2006.

"Veterans in suicidal crisis can now receive the free, worldclass emergency health care they deserve – no matter where they need it, when they need it, or whether they're enrolled in VA care," said VA Secretary for Veterans Affairs Denis McDonough. "This expansion of care will save Veterans' lives, and there's nothing more important than that."

Protecting Your PACT Act Benefits

Have you seen television commercials, social media posts, or other advertisements from companies telling you to "act now" to claim your Camp Lejeune or PACT Act benefits? Are you wondering if you're eligible for the new presumptive benefits and need their legal representation? Here's the information you need to know to protect yourself from predatory third-party companies.

How to safely file for and claim your PACT Act Benefits VA wants you to know there are some predatory companies, not recognized by VA, that are targeting you by offering to assist you with your VA benefit claim. These companies charge absurd fees or require you to pay a portion of your VA benefits. VA will never charge you to apply for the benefits you may be entitled to. If you think you're entitled to benefits, please review the following preventive measures to help guard against

fraud and scams.


- Apply directly to VA. If you plan to file a claim, you may submit your claim in person at any regional office or online.
 VA will help you gather the evidence you need to support your claim. There are no costs or hidden fees to file a claim for benefits.
- Be cautious of media advertisements from companies who
 provide information about the recent changes in law for
 toxic-exposure benefit claims and suggest Veterans can
 only obtain VA benefits with their help. These companies
 may not be recognized by the VA and may be trying
 to charge Veterans illegal fees. Use the VA Office of
 General Counsel (OGC) Accreditation Search to confirm
 and validate the credentials of anyone offering claims
 assistance.
- Do not sign a contract agreeing to pay an unauthorized company a fee to help you with your VA claim. There are accredited Veterans Service Organizations, agents and attorneys who may assist you.
- Only VA-accredited agents and attorneys may charge Veterans for assistance on their VA claim, and only when they provide assistance in connection with a proceeding after VA has made an initial decision on a Veteran's claim. No individual or organization may charge a claimant a fee for filing an initial VA claim.
- Be cautious of companies claiming to be contacting you on behalf of VA. Contact VA directly at 1-800-827-1000 if you are unsure about the authenticity of a message you've received.
- Review all documents thoroughly. Never sign a blank form for someone else to complete later. They should always review the completed form before signing and retain a copy of the completed form for their records.

If you are ever uncertain about a contact or believe you or someone you know is a victim of VA benefits scams, please contact the VA Office of Inspector General at (OIG) Hotline (va. gov).

Healing the Wounded Heart

To register or to learn more, call: Jamie Pritchett 321-961-8763 David Rosenbaum 321-961-1708 The term "wounded veteran" calls up images of combat casualties lying in a hospital bed, hobbling on crutches, or learning to overcome a disability.

Wounds that cannot be seen are unlikely to draw empathy. Yet a veteran who appears physically whole may be hiding a heart and a soul that have been shattered

Heart wounds can result in disabilities that cripple relationships and crush the capacity for joy. Trauma—how one reacts to events that cause intense fear, helplessness, or horror—may confuse one's confidence about how to function in society.

"Healing the Wounded Heart" is one way to address trauma. A small group (up to 12) meets for six sessions to learn about the nature of heart wounds, grief, loss, and forgiveness. It is a place to unload burdens long carried in silence, guilt, and shame.

Trained facilitators lead the class, but the healing comes from interaction between participants. The Bible is a key resource, but you need not be a Christian to benefit. The need for confidentiality is stressed.

There is no fee, but a freewill offering will be received at the end of the class, when you have been able to judge how much value you have received from the program.

The six sessions follow in quick succession to improve retention of the material. If the times and dates below don't work for you, tell us what works better for future classes. Class size is limited to 12, so register early.
