Record Breaking Support to Brevard JROTC and other Cadet Programs

Brevard County likely has one of the largest and most active high school JROTC programs in Florida and beyond. As the 2023-24 school year begins, the 14 programs in Brevard Public Schools expect another active turnout and busy year with each school averaging over 160 cadets.

The county boasts seven US Army, three USAF, and two Navy JROTC units along with one Marine and one Space Force unit. Brevard also as five other "cadet" programs which operate independently of the school system — two Sea Cadet, two Civil Air Patrol and one Sea Scout Ship program support our youth locally.

As JROTC instructors plan their year, costs of many activities are not fully covered by BPS or the military services that sponsor them, so fund raisers like car washes, parent contributions or help from veteran organizations are required each year.

Thanks to record breaking donations in 2023 and their 2022 Golf Tournament Fund Raiser, the Good Deeds Foundation of the Cape Canaveral Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAACC) was able to provide \$2,200 to every school-based JROTC Unit, \$1,200 to the five independent Cadet Units and \$4000 to set aside for purchasing all trophies and medals for 2023-24 school year competitions in the Raider Challenge, Drill and Air Rifle. The total donation to these programs is \$38,600 this school year!!

Many veteran organizations support the cadets because they all know molding our youth to be good citizens is crucial to the future of our amazing country. They also know how valuable the role of all the JROTC and other Cadet Instructors is with support from the service branches and BPS. With significant funding support, instructors and cadet leaders can focus more on their training and education missions and less on wondering where the needed extra money will come from.

In Brevard, the Veterans Memorial Center Military Museum and Park is another supportive treasure for JROTC units since many major competitions, museum field trips and other programs are held there free of charge.

BVC Donation Furthers Genealogical Research in Georgia

Over the last year, the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center Library found itself running out of room. Generous recent donations taxed our available space, many of which were duplicates of current holdings. Thankfully, we found a perfect recipient that can use our duplicates in Homerville, GA, a small town just over the FL border, in the Huxford-Spear Library. The world class ancestral research facility located there is managed by the Huxford Genealogical Society. Our donation will join Judge Folks Huxford's extensive collection of family histories from the Wiregrass region and the merged collections from the Elmer Spear Genealogy Library from Madison, Florida. Within the library more than 57,000 research books and other materials can be found, including 16,000 family folders and a large collection of microfilm and microfiche.

Shown on the right is a "farewell" to our excess which has kindly been delivered to Huxford by two Huxford Genealogical Society associates. One of the associates, Steve Purkey, has family connections in Homerville and was on the way to visit. He was gracious enough to stop by the BVC to pick up donations and deliver the load to Huxford. The VMC a has a prior history with the Huxford Society; Ray Norman previously delivered to them 500 photo albums of Civil War generals (about 1000 lbs worth!).



The Civil War volumes were excess to the Florida Historical Society as they were not specific to Florida. BVC did not have the space for these oversized photo albums but Huxford did.

Librarians did a review of our collections of Military Services during August. We removed many books catalogued in the past but no longer feel our public has interest in checking out. As a result, we now have more space available for new books in several areas. Among these areas are BlackOps, WarOnTerror, Air Force, Navy, Marines, Army and Biographies. We also now have a new collection called Joint Military Aviation (JMA). Each of our Military Services has a variant of a specific

Twelve Honored at Purple Heart Ceremony at VMC

On August 6, twelve recipients of military Purple Hearts from WWII to Iraq were honored at the Veterans Memorial Center in the seventh annual ceremony of its kind.

Brevard Chapter 453 of the Military Order of the Purple Heart (MOPH) holds their unique ceremony on the Sunday afternoon closest to National Purple Heart Day, August 7th. This year, more than 160 people attended the indoor event as emotional stories of how each veteran received their Purple Hearts (in one case, three) were read by fellow Purple Heart Recipients or MOPH members.

Each person honored saw an engraved brick that will later be placed at the Purple Heart Monument in the VMC Memorial Plaza. After their stories were read, Karmen Sowers and her Quilts of Valor volunteer group presented the veterans with beautiful handmade patriotic themed quilts. Emotions and stories of valor in combat ran high during the ceremony.

Carl Miller, Commander of MOPH 453 was there as Master of Ceremonies introducing the readers and recipients. Family members and friends joined as the stories were read, some

Chaplain's Corner by Chaplain Chip Hanson USMC (Fmr)

ore than 30,000 Americans commit suicide each year; hundreds of thousands more attempt it but fail. As a deliberate act to end one's own life, suicide appears an athema in a society seemingly obsessed with improving health and prolonging life. Yet suicide was the 11th leading cause of death in the United States in 2007. Suicide brings pain to the families of victims and exacts economic costs for the country.

Unfortunately, for more than a decade, the suicide rate has been rising in the general U.S. population, especially among veterans, men, and women who risked their lives for the country. In its 2018–2024 strategic plan, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) identified preventing veteran suicide as its highest clinical priority, and the RAND Epstein Family Veterans Policy Research Institute is committed to helping VA– and the country–achieve this critical goal.

The largest number of veterans who die by suicide are between 55 and 74 years old. The highest suicide rates have historically been among the oldest Americans. Many elderly have undiagnosed or untreated depression, which can be intensified by the trauma of losing a spouse or the stress of living with a chronic illness. Elderly adults often lack frequent social interactions that can help protect them against the loneliness that can exacerbate depression. Compared with suicide attempts among younger people, suicides among older adults tend to be carefully planned and more likely to be successful.

Many elderlies also have underlying health conditions, which reduces their chances of surviving a suicide attempt compared with younger adults. Suicide rates have actually declined for older adults since 1999, but they remain higher than those in most other age groups.

Women Veteran Outreach & Support Group has Successful Kick Off

On Friday, August 18, 2023, dozens of women veterans came together for the Women Veteran Outreach & Support luncheon sponsored by the Brevard Veterans Council, Veterans Memorial Center, and Their Voice of Hope.

What a success our first meeting was!!! Two hours flew by, and we could have used another two hours. These warriors laughed, cried, and shared resources and frustrations. But most of all they were so appreciative for being recognized as veterans!! One thing that everyone agreed upon was that we need to keep this group going – and I committed to them that I will do my best to do just that. So, our next luncheon is scheduled for October 24, 2023.

An issue that kept coming up is that many of our women veterans do not receive the health care they need because they do not like to go to the doctor's office alone. Whether it's the VA facility or a private doctor. A program that has come out of this need is the Buddy Program.

What is the Buddy Program?

The Buddy Program is a program in development where volunteers will partner with a female veteran to attend doctors' appointments with them. The purpose will be to help the veteran feel comfortable, safe, and supported and to act as a second set of eyes and ears when meeting with the doctor. The relationship will be determined between the veteran and the buddy. The buddy will also be there to advocate for the veteran when necessary. Many other programs aer soon to be implemented, and we are all looking forward to them being successful.

As always, it takes a village. One person cannot do it alone – and as I've always said, Brevard County



Book Report

Andrew Jackson and the Miracle of New Orleans by Brian Kilmeade Report by Librarian Joe Davie, Catalog # Bio-Jack-02



The war of 1812 saw America threatened on all sides. The British had encouraged the Indians on the frontier areas to attack settlers. The British also were stopping American ships sailing from our ports and forcing sailors to join and serve in the Royal Navy.

President Madison led congress in declaring War against England, at which point the Royal Navy left England with

a large Expeditionary force of more than 50 Ships. Included were Landing Ships with an experienced Army of 10,000 soldiers that had fought Napoleon, as well as landing barges on board to attack coastal cities. Their plans included sailing to a central location and anchoring off their British Island of Jamaca. Vice Admiral Alexander Cochranec commanded six large ships of the line of the Royal Navy and General Edward Packenham commanded the Army. Together, the Army planned to attack Washington, D.C. and Baltimore from Chesapeake Bay and in quick succession to attack New Orleans from the islands off the Gulf Coast in order to permanently occupy the Mississippi River and all lands west of the Mississippi.

Andrew Jackson and his Generals stood in the way of this plan approved by the Crown and members of Parliament in England. The book gives an incredibly detailed account of the strategy and tactics employed by both sides. How Andrew Jackson was able to unify the diverse population of New Orleans and build a fortified line that defeated the army and navy from England for the second time is an extremely exciting read.

Jackson, who grew up as an orphan on the American frontier, rose to a successful two term presidency due to his military accomplishments.

How the PACT Act Works for Current VA Beneficiaries

The Department of Veterans Affairs screened more than 4 million U.S. military veterans in the first year of the new PACT Act to find out if they thought they'd been exposed to toxins during their military service. The vast majority of those screened were already enrolled in VA health care.

Of those millions of veterans, 1.7 million had "screened positive" for possible exposure, Steve Miska, the VA's PACT Act transitional executive director, told Military.com.

As a result, the VA is reaching back out to those veterans, "encouraging them to file a supplemental claim that could potentially increase benefits, whether on the health-care side or many of the other benefits," Miska said.

The PACT Act linked a variety of medical conditions with toxins common during specific eras or circumstances of military service. Rather than require veterans or their survivors to prove that a toxic exposure caused a given condition, the law assumes that some illnesses are service connected if the person served in a certain place at a certain time. This means that veterans may be eligible for additional VA benefits based on past toxic exposure during their service.

Here's how the PACT Act could affect existing VA beneficiaries:

Veterans Who Already Receive Partial Disability Pay

Veterans who already have a partial VA disability rating could have their rating increased now that the VA covers more conditions under the PACT Act, and they don't need to fear that applying could potentially cause their rating to decrease instead, VA officials told Military.com.

That increased rating could add up to a significant difference in monthly compensation, especially for veterans with dependents. For example, a veteran with a spouse and two dependent children under age 18 whose disability rating rises from 10% to 60% could see their pay rise from \$165.92 a month to \$1,588.65 a month in 2023. "And we are not looking back at other service-connected issues trying to decrease those," Kaitlin Richards, assistant director in the VA's Office of Policy and Oversight, told Military.com.

Veterans Who Already Receive 100% Disability Pay

Even those veterans who already receive the maximum monthly disability benefit should file a PACT Act claim if they think they have a condition that's newly covered under the PACT Act, the VA officials told Military.com. Doing so could benefit not only the veterans now but their families later. "What I tell everyone -- because we always get that question -- is, even if you are 100% serviceconnected already, you should still file for benefits," Richards said. "Because if you get [declared] service-connected for a disability, and that is ultimately the disability that you pass away from, that -- whatever is listed on your death certificate -- is how your survivor, your spouse, will be able to file for their own benefits."

Meanwhile, veterans themselves may, depending on their condition, qualify for additional benefits if they need, for example, aid and attendance in everyday living or specially adapted housing. This "special monthly compensation ... is paying at an even higher level," Richards said. Establishing a service connection could ultimately help with burial, such as providing an allowance for costs.

Surviving Family Members Who Already Receive DIC

The survivors of deceased veterans who already receive the VA's Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) likely won't benefit from filing a toxic exposure claim now, "unless they have an increase in their disability [rating]," Richards said.

DIC beneficiaries can get an extra \$258 a month if their veteran

Survivors should file a new DIC claim if they think they qualify now, even if the VA denied their claim in the past.

Surviving Family Members Who Already Receive VA Survivors Pension

Current recipients of the VA's income-based Survivors Pension could become eligible for DIC instead if their service member died of a newly presumptive condition. Because the Survivors Pension is meant only to raise their income up to a certain threshold, depending on individual circumstances, the flat-rate DIC could pay more.
