

n 20 January the Veterans Memorial Center Park hosted a very different 5K race. Starting last Fall, the VMC worked with Edgewood Junior Senior High School Senior Nike Gividen and her student team to provide the venue and logistical support to make her vision a reality. More than 100 runners and sponsors, including State Farm, contributed to the "Stop The Traffic(king) 5K." The event was intended by the students to focus the community on the sad reality of increased human trafficking, even in Brevard County.

Endorsed and supported by a number of parents, the event went smoothly. Ms. Gividen offered pre-race remarks on why the effort was being made and how the funds would be used. Hometown News ran a short pre-race story and Press Releases after the event were planned. There was talk about making this an annual event for Edgewood as the briefing noted there is more slavery through human trafficking in the US now than even before the Civil War.

Not all wounds of War are visible.

Post-traumatic stress disorder symptoms may start within one month of a traumatic event, but sometimes symptoms may not appear until years after the event. These symptoms cause significant problems in social or work situations and relationships. They can also interfere with your ability to go about your normal daily tasks.

PTSD symptoms are generally grouped into four types: intrusive memories, avoidance, negative changes in thinking and mood, and changes in physical and emotional reactions. Symptoms can vary over time or vary from person to person.

Symptoms of intrusive memories may include:

- Recurrent, unwanted distressing memories of the traumatic event
- Reliving the traumatic event as if it were happening again (flashbacks)
- Upsetting dreams or nightmares about the traumatic event
- Severe emotional distress or physical reactions to something that reminds you of the traumatic event

Symptoms of avoidance may include:

- Trying to avoid thinking or talking about the traumatic event
- Avoiding places, activities, or people that remind you of the traumatic event

Symptoms of negative changes in thinking and mood may include:

- Negative thoughts about yourself, other people, or the world
- Hopelessness about the future
- Memory problems, including not remembering important aspects of the traumatic event
- Difficulty maintaining close relationships
- · Feeling detached from family and friends
- Lack of interest in activities you once enjoyed
- Difficulty experiencing positive emotions
- Feeling emotionally numb

- Symptoms of changes in physical and emotional reactions (also called arousal symptoms) may include:
- Being easily startled or frightened
- Always being on guard for danger
- Self-destructive behavior, such as drinking too much or driving too fast
- Trouble sleeping
- Trouble concentrating
- Irritability, angry outbursts, or aggressive behavior
- Overwhelming guilt or shame

According to the Pew Research Center, 96% of Veterans who have served, post-9/11, are proud of their service; however, nearly half say that readjusting to civilian life was difficult, most often citing family issues. About one in six Veterans were wounded in combat and slightly more than half experienced emotional trauma or distress while serving. Tragically, even with the positive, supportive culture we have, 84% of post-9/11 veterans feel like the public just doesn't understand the sacrifices made by them or their families. This touches on one truly hidden wound of war.

Rivetting Presentation on Francis Gary Powers and the Cold War U2 Incident

We'd like to thank Gary Powers, Jr. for presenting at the Veterans Memorial Center on Jan 29th. With over 40 in attendance, Gary's presentation about his father was well received.

As for my background, I have lectured internationally on the Cold War, my father, the U-2 Incident, espionage, and the need to honor Cold War veterans, preserve Cold War history, and educate future generations about this time period for over 30 years. My recent book, Spy Pilot: Francis Gary Powers, the U-2 Incident, and a Controversial Cold War Legacy, helps to set the record straight in regards to the fake news that surrounds the U-2 Incident and tarnished my father's reputation. It gives an overview of what it was like to grow up in the shadow of a famous Cold War figure, my search for the truth after my father's death in 1977 when I was 12 years old, and how my research led to the USAF and CIA posthumously awarding my father the POW Medal / Director's Medal and Silver Star in 2000 and 2012 respectively. My newest book, Enemy Territory, is a graphic novel about the U-2 Incident.

I discussed other related books and Spielberg's 2015 Cold War thriller, Bridge of Spies, on which I was a technical consultant, that depicts my father's exchange for Soviet spy Rudolph Able in 1962 at the Glienicker Bridge in Potsdam, Germany.

Putting Real Meaning into National Service Cemetery Day

MLK Holiday Restoration Work and Ceremony at Oak Hill Saints and Sinners

n 13 January, at a small, historically African American Cemetery in the tiny town of Oak Hill, Florida, only 10 miles north of the VA Cape Canaveral National Cemetery, something very special happened. More than 85 people including many veterans from Volusia and Brevard County as well as the community, came together to restore headstones from vandalized and sunken veteran grave sites. They were also there to honor the veterans and hold a re-dedication and remembrance military burial ceremony for one family who missed that promised ceremony decades earlier.

This year, the VA National Cemetery Administration (VA/NCA) chose the tiny Saints and Sinners Cemetery in Oak Hill to support on MLK Day. A new headstone was supplied, in the case of one family, and ongoing support given to repair 21 veteran grave sites damaged by vandalism, floods and neglect over many decades. Dan Devine, the VA/NVA Outreach Director organized the support and came to Florida for the Ceremony. Most of the veterans were from WWI and WWII.

There are five million veterans who rest in peace at carefully maintained VA Cemeteries, but millions more are buried in private

cemeteries. All are entitled to a military service and a proper headstone or marker. On that day, two such headstones were brought to VA/NCA standards, one was raised from being almost fully sunken in the flood prone area, and another provided a brand new headstone by the NCA after having been crushed by vandals.

More than 20 descendants of Army SP5 Blaise Merrick Cook drove from Miami and Jacksonville to see the new headstone unveiled and to be honored by American Legion Post 285 of Edgewater, FL with their Honor Guard. They performed folding the flag and presented it to her sister, the rifle salute and Taps. In addition, the Fitzgerald family of Mims provided their beautiful caisson while Doug Bisset and Hans Hunt of the Brevard Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) connected the first veterans in America (their ancestors) with uniforms and the firing of a miniature Revolutionary War Cannon in honor of Ms. Cook.

Numerous veteran organizations from both counties planned and conducted the event. Special hats off to Dru-Ann Welch and others from the Oak Hill Saints and Sinners Historic African American Cemetery Restoration, Inc. committee. They began their work 18 months ago and still have months ahead to finish all 21 veteran sites in the still active cemetery. More than 35 veterans and others came north from Brevard to provide logistical support and funding from the Good Deeds Foundation of the Cape Canaveral Chapter of the Military Officer's Association of America.

It was truly a case of many communities, including many veterans, coming together. When the 45 minute ceremony was over and the work continued, there were many smiles and some tears, but all were happy they spent that holiday in service in a very unique way and place.



Book Report

The Battle of Sackett's Harbour -1813 by Patrick A. Wilder



Author Wilder is a studious sort who worked for 25 years as a New York Office of Parks and Historic Preservation historian. As such, he was unimpressed with earlier versions of the Sackett battle and set to correct earlier versions of the fracas with ground truth observation. He reviewed the terrain, making personal visits to the harbour itself, and the British, Canadian and US historical records.

This story in ten chapters is a small book about a naval battle(s) after the 1776 Boston tea party. The US declared war against the United Kingdom on June 18, 1812. Sackett's Harbor became an important naval cog in the Battle of 1812 and the Battle of Fort Erie in 1814. Sackett (Sacket) was a New York land developer who thought that the little harbor on the Lake Ontario at the entrance of the St. Lawrence River would be a good investment in the 1800s. The Harbor was well protected by the surrounding hills. Sackett built a nice house, the US built fort, and all was well. However, there seemed to be a lingering issue with the Brits as they took issue with the Americans in the area. A series of land battles and lake wars ensued.

Author Wilder takes us through these extended battles; imagine thunderous roars, ship building and naval battles on the Lake. It is an interesting read for a quick overview but it's easy to get bogged down if you want to see better detail of land troop placements and lake ship movements. Enjoy!

How TRICARE Covers Ambulance Services

In some emergencies, an ambulance could be the difference between life and death. Fortunately, your TRICARE plan covers ambulance services in these events. "TRICARE covers ambulance services when medically necessary, based on the condition of the beneficiary receiving the service," said Elan Green, chief of TRICARE Health Plan's Medical Benefit and Reimbursement Section at the Defense Health Agency. "It's good to know how TRICARE covers these services before you have an emergency. This can help you avoid surprise costs." If you have TRICARE For Life, you must follow Medicare's rules for ambulance services.* This doesn't apply if you live outside the United States and U.S. territories. For other plans, read on to learn how TRICARE covers ambulance services.

*Medicare rules are lengthy and will be provided at a later date.

Outpatient and Inpatient Ambulance Services

Your location plays a role in the type of ambulance service you receive. Outpatient ambulance service happens when an ambulance takes you from your home, an accident scene, or another location to a hospital. Inpatient ambulance service happens when an ambulance takes you from one hospital to a hospital more capable of providing the care you need. These services have out-of-pocket costs based on:

- Your TRICARE plan.
- Your beneficiary group.
- Whether you go to a network hospital or a non-network hospital.
- Whether the ambulance service is inpatient or outpatient.

You can find these costs with the Compare Costs tool. Call your regional contractor to learn more.

Treat-and-Release Service

Treat-and-release service is when an ambulance treats you for an emergency but doesn't take you to a hospital. TRICARE covers treat-and-release when:

- The services you receive are medically necessary.
- You don't need to go to a hospital.

• You refuse transport after being treated.

Air and Boat Evacuation

Emergency transport by air or boat may be medically necessary. TRICARE covers air or boat evacuation only if:

- A regular "land" ambulance can't get to you.
- The nearest facility is far away or there are other obstacles.
- You must be seen quickly for your medical condition.
- You can't safely get the care you need in your location.
- You're taken to the nearest hospital with appropriate facilities.

Ambulance Services Overseas

The TRICARE Overseas contractor, International SOS, provides 24/7 support if you need emergency care. Call International SOS to confirm your coverage before you receive ambulance transport. On the Contact Us page, choose where you're located to see a list of contact numbers, including Medical Assistance numbers. As noted in the TRICARE Overseas Program Handbook, you should only call Medical Assistance numbers to coordinate emergency care.

Limitations

TRICARE doesn't cover ambulance services that aren't medically necessary. To learn more about what TRICARE covers, check out Ambulance Services. Remember, if you have a medical emergency, call 911 or visit the nearest emergency room.

COLLABORATION AT THE BVMC


This may be a good time to talk about the organizational structure of the <u>Brevard Veterans Memorial Center</u>, i.e. the "BVMC". This entity is actually comprised of two separate bodies, the <u>Brevard Veterans Council</u> (BVC) and the affiliated <u>Veterans Memorial Center</u> (VMC). Overseeing both of these entities is an Executive Committee to manage the day to day business and provide Command, Control and Communications. Both organizations work to assist veterans (and their families) in need. While the BVC works with assistance groups throughout Brevard county, the VMC houses "tenant" veteran service organizations (VSO's) which utilize the facilities to support their causes. Currently 17 groups comprise the Tenant Committees. Groups such as the <u>Sea Cadets</u>, <u>Sons of the American Revolution</u>, the <u>American Legion</u>, the <u>Marine Corps League</u>, the <u>Fleet Reserve Association</u>, and several other VSO's comprise Tenant Committees. All of these working to keep the museum and the grounds, an 82 acre Brevard County park, centered on veteran affairs and support.

Our monthly membership meetings on the second Wednesday of each month at 0930, pulls together government (state and federal), private, and membership organizations to help all veterans in need in Brevard county. Over 35 different participants are available to co-ordinate and participate in veteran services with the BVMC working as the hub in this effort.



Recently, two of our tenants came together when they saw a need with-in the center. After a new overhead projector was installed in the Gray Room to increase the technical capabilities and provide support for the units that utilize the facility, it became apparent that

the previous connection methods were insufficient and outdated. <u>The Marine Corps League</u> and <u>The Fleet Reserve Association</u> came together to fund, purchase, and install two new interfaces for the projector, dressing up the area, and providing a clean look to the room and facility.
