# VMC Hosts Major Initiative to Support Brevard County

fter months of planning meetings, mostly at the VMC, a new project in Brevard launched on 15 Feb at the VMC Museum. It is the Education & Citizenship Armed Forces Coalition of the Space Coast (ECAC). The group will eventually include leaders from all schools, public, private, and home school at all grade levels; DoD, USG Contractors, and active-duty military outreach units; many veteran organizations and other groups like Rotary that sponsor scholarships and other youth programs. The program is set to launch in August when the new 2024-25 school year begins.

#### The group has three goals:

- A) Steer students toward the more than 23 Brevard County Museums to both visit for credit and to perform service hours. This part will kick off in the summer if all goes well.
- 2. B) Engage all veteran and many civic groups to provide details of their student scholarship and awards programs as well as military track training programs from Academies to STEM programs to be compiled in a list including deadlines, details and how to apply information. This will then be made available to all guidance counsellors and other teachers in all schools to encourage a wider range of participation. All this will be intended to help students find and fund more education.
- C) Expand opportunities for STEM related learning through new programs in the Brevard Public Schools; an outreach STEM program at PSFB; and other organizational STEM programs like the Civil Air Patrol, Fleet Reserve at Titusville HS and more.

The next planning meeting of ECAC will be 02 May at the VMC Museum 1800-2000, when more members outlined above will be invited to join and sign-up for their programs.

## This month I am going to pass along information about our National Cemeteries.

ALL Veterans with an honorable discharge are eligible to be interred in any National Cemetery. No one can reserve a spot in any National Cemetery. The exception Is if both Spouses are Veterans, and one dies the remaining Spouse can reserve the spot next to the deceased.

Burial benefits available include a gravesite in any of our National Cemeteries with available space, opening, and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a Government headstone or marker, a burial flag with Military Honors from their Branch of the Military, and a Presidential Memorial Certificate, at no cost to the family. Some Veterans may also be eligible for Burial Allowance.

Burial benefits available for spouses and dependents buried in a national cemetery include burial with the Veteran, perpetual care, and the spouse or dependents' name and date of birth and death will be inscribed on the Veteran's headstone, at no cost to the family. Eligible spouses and dependents may be buried, even if they predecease the Veteran.

### **Creamation as an Option**

Cremated remains represent about 75% of interments in National Cemeteries. They receive the same honors as casketed remains. However, with cremated remains, there are 4 separate ways of interment:

- They can be buried in the same manner as a casket, with the same headstone as a standard casket grave.
- The cremated remains can be placed in the columbarium (a wall with areas for the urns).
- The ashes can be buried in the Ossuary (a Memorial Garden) and the name placed on the Memorial Wall.
- Finally, if the Family chooses to spread the ashes in a manner that cannot be visited (such as spreading them around in the ocean or a meadow or other ways the Veteran wanted to interned), the name of the Veteran can be placed on the Memorial Wall.

There is never a charge for any interment at a National Cemetery or the Memorial Wall.

Finally, Veterans aren't eligible if they were convicted of a Tier III sex offense and sentenced to a minimum of life imprisonment—and the conviction is final. These Veterans also don't qualify for a Presidential Memorial Certificate, a burial flag, a headstone, or a marker. (Oct 12, 2022)



Your attendance to recognize our Vietnam Veterans, and their families, is much appreciated.





The French settled in Quebec at about the same time as the British settled in Jamestown and Plymouth. The French explored and claimed the Mississippi and Ohio rivers, but the English primarily stayed along the east coast. For the French, rivers were their roads. French traded with the Indians and lived among them. The English live apart from the Indians. In fact, the English fought several minor wars with the Indians in New England in the 1600s.

In October of 1753, Governor Dinwiddie of Virginia sent Washington to the disputed territory to ask the French to leave – the French refused. Washington returned to Williamsburg, Virginia arriving in January 1754. His report to the Governor indicated "The French have swept south." 
We will be having monthly yoga sessions for women veterans. These will be held in the Gray Hall at the Veterans Memorial Center. See flyer.

Rodger A. Pickett: Born 19 Feb 1945 grew up as an Air Force dependent, attending 18 schools in twelve years and finally graduating from Taipei American High School in 1963, I attended Indian State Univ. for 3 years and joined the U.S. Army Warrant Officer flight training program.



Graduating as a W-01 in 1968 and assigned to Fort Sam Huston, Tx. for training as a Medical Evacuation (Dust-off) Pilot. After a Combat tour in Vietnam\*\* in 1969 and teaching basic helicopter flying at Fort Wolters Tx. for 3 yrs., I accepted a direct commission as an Armor Officer and went on to Fort Riley Ks. to command the First Infantry **Division Adjutant General** Company.

Leaving the Army in 1975 and completing his B.S. degree at Kansas State University in 1976 I obtained a position with

the General Dynamics F-16 program office in Fort Worth Tx., managing the retrofit and configuration management programs for the F-16 fleets of Israel, Egypt, and Venezuela.

Leaving General Dynamics in 1985 I moved to my family home in Brevard County FL. and joined Harris Corporation in Palm Bay FL, rising to Senior Principal Engineer, I managed several diverse workforce teams in Logistics and Information Technology.

In 1997 at Computer Sciences Raytheon and later L-3, I Directed a \$24 million dollar supply support program for the Space Lift Range contract at Patrick AFB. I architected and directed the implementation of the MAXIMO Material Review Program, providing total asset visibility of all range equipment. I designed, wrote and implemented the Logistics Management Information database and managed the Materials Planning

function until 2008.

As a resident of the Florida Space Coast, I provided IT management expertise and high-level logistics management on many multi-million-dollar contracts for L-3 Communications, Titan, CSR, IAP, and Harris Corporations.

I joined the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) in 1994 after recognizing and admitting I had several service-connected disabilities and became a Service Officer in 2014 to help other Veterans recognize service-connected disabilities and how to get help and compensation from the VA for those disabilities. To date serving over 5000 volunteer DAV hours, I am the Senior. Service Officer and Senior Vice Commander for DAV Chapter 123 in Merritt Island. I am also an accredited Veteran Service Officer (VSO) for the DAV Department of Florida, currently serving at the Viera VA Clinic. I also hold a Commercial Instrument Pilot Certificate for Helicopter and Fixed Wing aircraft.

\*\*Rodger is really a modest man. He does not know I am adding the following to his biography. While I was watching "Wings Over Vietnam" I got to the part about the "Dust Off" operations and I got interested in it and started to research more and I found the following:

### PICKETT, ROGER A.

Chief Warrant Officer 2, Army Medical Department,
U.S. Army
68th Medical Detachment (HA)
Date of Action: 23 May 1969



Citation: By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, AR 672-5-1, and USARV Reg 672-1, the Air Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement while participating in aerial flight is awarded to Chief Warrant Officer Two Roger A. Pickett, Army Medical Department, United States Army, for heroism in aerial flight in the Republic of Vietnam. Chief Warrant Officer Pickett was the aircraft commander of a dustoff helicopter that was called upon to evacuate the wounded from a helicopter that had been shot down by hostile fire. The ship had gone down in a dense jungle area and a hoist rescue was required. Other helicopters that had been in the area had drawn heavy small arms and automatic weapons fire. After assessing the ground situation and his gunship support, CW2 Pickett decided to attempt the extraction. As CW2 Pickett skillfully maneuvered the aircraft to a tree top hover over the crash wreckage, the hoist was lowered. The injured on the ground was unable to get to the hoist and the crew chief volunteered to ride the hoist down and to aid the wounded soldier. As CW2 Pickett continued to hold the aircraft hover, the crew chief went down with the hoist, located the injured, and crawled with him back to the hoist. At this time the dustoff helicopter came under fire from hostile ground forces. Despite the great personal dangers involved, CW2 Pickett maintained the aircraft at a hover until the injured soldier and the crew chief were aboard the aircraft. Chief Warrant Offer Pickett's skills as a pilot and heroism in the face of known enemy danger are in keeping with the highest military traditions and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

# How Medicare Covers Ambulance Services for TriCare for Life Veterans

Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance) covers ground ambulance transportation when traveling in any other vehicle could endanger your health, and you need medically necessary services from a:

- Hospital
- Critical access hospital
- Rural emergency hospital, or
- Skilled nursing facility

Medicare may pay for emergency ambulance transportation in an airplane or helicopter if you need immediate and rapid transport that ground transportation can't provide. In some cases, Medicare may pay for limited, medically necessary, non-emergency ambulance transportation if you have a written order from your doctor stating that the transportation is medically necessary. For example, someone with End-Stage Renal Disease may need medically necessary ambulance transport to a kidney dialysis facility.

Your costs in Original Medicare After you meet the Part B deductible, you pay 20% of the Medicare-Approved Amount.

Your doctor or other health care provider may recommend you get services more often than Medicare covers. Or they may recommend services that Medicare doesn't cover. If this happens, you may have to pay some or all the costs. Ask questions so you understand why your doctor is recommending certain services and if, or how much, Medicare will pay for them.

To find out how much your test, item, or service will cost, talk to your doctor or health care provider. The specific amount you'll owe may depend on several things, like:

- Other insurance you may have.
- How much your doctor charges.
- If your doctor accepts assignment
- The type of facility
- Where you get your test, item, or service.

### Things to know:

Medicare will only cover ambulance services to the nearest appropriate medical facility that's able to give you the care you need. The ambulance company must give you an "Advance Beneficiary Notice of Noncoverage (ABN)" when both of these apply:

You got ambulance services in a non-emergency situation.

• The ambulance company believes that Medicare may not pay for your specific ambulance service.

You may now be affected by a Medicare demonstration program if:

- You get scheduled, non-emergency ambulance transportation for 3 or more round trips in a 10-day period or at least once a week for 3 weeks or more.
- You get this transportation from any ambulance company nationwide.

Under this demonstration, your ambulance company may send a request for prior authorization to Medicare before your fourth-round trip in a 30-day period. They'll do this so you and the company will know earlier in the process if Medicare is likely to cover your services.

If your prior authorization request isn't approved and you continue getting these services, Medicare will deny the claim and the ambulance company may bill you for all charges. Either you or your ambulance company may request prior authorization for these scheduled, non-emergency ambulance services.

#### The Ship -- CSS Tallahassee

A true story of maritime audacity that has never received proper treatment.

In August 1864, the Confederate Navy deployed the fast cruiser Tallahassee to threaten the Northeast Coast of US. A beleaguered Lincoln administration faces the possibility of a failed war effort and a probable defeat in the coming national election.



At the same time, the leaders of the Confederate government desperately seek victory in their struggle for their nation's survival.

The success or failure of the raid would have an impact on the public perception-both North and South-regarding the overall progress of the war.

#### The Captain -- John Taylor Wood



John Taylor Wood, was a 3rd-generation military man born in 1830, at Fort Snelling (now the city of St. Paul, Minnesota), where his father, Robert Crooke Wood, was an assistant surgeon in the U.S. Army.

His mother, Anne Taylor, was a daughter of the post's commander, General Zachary Taylor, a future president of the United States. [grandson]

And when a young officer named Jefferson Davis married one of the general's other daughters, Sarah, Wood also became the nephew of the future president of the Confederate States of America.
