VMC President's Report

Memorial Day was last Monday, and the Veterans Memorial Center honored our fallen. Each name engraved in our plaza and on monuments across our country represents a story of courage, sacrifice, and selflessness. They remind us that freedom comes at a great cost and that it is our duty to honor and uphold the legacy of those who have gone before us.

May was a busy month with several events to support. We went as far as Deland, Florida to participate in Volusia County Valor Days. Thanks to Ed Pingston, our amazing Curator, and to Kristi Blanchard for promoting our Museum. This was followed by a wellattended Back Brevard Heros Day at the VMC to honor all first responders. They also had a record 50/50 drawing! The Vietnam and All Veterans of Brevard (VVB) held a great event at Wickham Park with the Vietnam Moving Wall and subsequent walls to honor all veterans that made the ultimate sacrifice. Many veteran organizations, including the VMC, placed wreaths at the Wall to honor veterans.

With May being the end of the school year, many of us attended awards programs to present awards to the high achievers. Of special note was the MOAACC Luncheon to honor 27 JROTC Cadets from Brevard schools who received either JROTC scholarships or service Academy appointments. What an honor!

This brings me to the next topic: Scholarships! The VMC scholarships have around \$20,000 to award and the deadline is fast approaching, June 28. The Military Officers Association of America Cape Canaveral Chapter (MOAACC) has around \$70,000 to award and their deadline is even closer, June 15. PLEASE get the word out to anyone you know who needs financial assistance to continue their education.

Donn Weaver and I have been working with a coalition that consists of retired veterans, museum leaders, veteran organization leaders, educators, elected officials, and community partners. The ECAC (Education & Citizenship Armed Forces Coalition of the Space Coast) was formed a year ago with the sole purpose of supporting the youth of Brevard to become model citizens. The first three tasks the coalition took on to support this goal included increasing participation with local museums, increasing civic scholarships and competitions, and increasing the availability and participation of civic minded STEM programs.

The first of these goals has been completed with the Museums of Brevard (MOB) by launching a Passport Program with 20 museums around Brevard beginning on June 1st. Students will carry their passports during visits to the museums and historic homes of Brevard to get it stamped for participation and eventually receive awards and recognition from the Brevard County School Board.

The slate of those running for office was approved at the last general meeting and the election will be held on June 12th. It is your duty to attend and cast your vote!

Finally, I want to thank all volunteers for keeping the Center operating and for your dedication. God bless our fallen heroes, God bless our armed forces, and God bless America.



Book Report: Modern Warriors by Pete Hegseth

Modern Warriors is told by US Army Veterans, Navy Seals, and combat pilots in their own words. Vivid descriptions of battlefield experiences and personal reflections of how their personal lives were affected are included. What inspired them to become warriors, their training and multiple deployments in Iraq. Afghanistan, and special operations around the Mediterranean. These stories are unfiltered and told from the personal perspective



of the individuals. Many of the warriors names found in this book are familiar to us as these Heroes go on to hold positions in Congress or are recognized authorities on Modern warfare.

Pete Hegseth, a decorated Army Veteran of three Army combat deployments has conversations with these Modern Warriors and relates in depth the details of their battlefield experiences. Key questions like how they dealt with the reality of warfare and what it meant to them and coming home how they adjusted to life after the military. Outreach is an activity of providing services to any populations who might not otherwise have access to those services A key component of outreach is that the groups providing it are not stationary, but mobile; in other words, they are meeting those in need of outreach services at the locations where those in need are In addition to delivering services, outreach has an educational role, raising the awareness of existing services. It includes the identification of underserved populations and referral to services.

Objectives (According to the website Showers of Blessings):

- To analyze the local Veterans, and community to determine the breadth and scope of needs
- To assess our strengths and abilities for outreach
- To determine appropriate responses within our abilities, strengths, and interests
- Compassion involves addressing the immediate needs of Veterans, families, and communities (food, clothing, emergency housing, employment, etc. give
- Assistance involves addressing changes in local communities related to welfare, long-term housing, education, community economic development, and health services.
- To offer encouragement and support for those participating in outreach programs
- To track the activities of all we do through sponsored events, activities, and the actions of individuals

At the DAV 123, we are working with veterans to provide them with an income to not only live on, but also for aid and attendance. Some DAV chapters like Titusville 109 offer transportation to veterans. DAV 123 works with different hospice organizations to help terminal veterans. DAV 123 also provides programs at different retirement communities concerning the benefits for veterans. I conduct funerals, celebrations of life, and graveside services, several times a week, free of charge to veteran families. Brevard County's NVHS is an organization dedicated to helping homeless veterans and their families.



Governance Meet Your Committee Report Candidates

Voting Procedures

Well, here it is election time again, and we should just remind everyone what the by-laws state about election procedure. In Article VII Section 3 "The complete slate of nominees and sample ballot will be published in the June edition of the Council Courier for the benefit of the members.

Article VII Section 6/ Sub Section A-G At the June membership meeting, individual and organizational members will elect the officers and board members for the coming year.

A) There will be a 1.5 hour time frame, 8:30 to 10:00 A.M. for members to cast votes prior to the start of the June membership meeting. The membership Chairman shall use the current membership data print out to verify eligibility to vote. If the member does not possess a valid membership card, they must produce a valid photo identification.

B) For organizational memberships, the Point Of Contact for that organization, upon presentation of a valid photo ID, will receive one ballot to be cast as the organization's valid representative (Individual members may not also be an organizational representative. One Person One Vote.

C) You must be 18 yrs or older to vote.

D) Upon verification, the verified member or organizational representative, will receive a numbered ticket. Numbered tickets are used for tracking purposes and validation of number of ballots distributed and received.

E) Upon entering the voting room the member or organizational member shall present their ticket to the teller, and in return receive one ballot which will be completed and placed in the ballot box.

F) At the completion of the allotted time, Announce to voting is closed, oversee the process as the tellers tally the votes, and report the results to the presiding officer.

G) A majority of votes will be required to elect a candidate for officer or board member. In event of a tie, there will be a run-off election announced by the secretary.

Candidate Bios

Don Pearsall for Brevard Veterans Council Chairman

I am running for the position of Chairman for the Brevard Veterans Council (BVC) for several reasons, First, I am not the kind of person to sit around and watch others work. I am a hands-on team player. I hope to bring new life to existing programs and implement a few more to benefit Brevard Veterans and their families. I currently sit on:

- Congressman's Posey's Veteran advisory Task Force,
- Brevard County Military Affairs Council,
- Governor DeSantis Forward March Initiative

I was born in rural, Lake Ronkonkoma, on Long Island. I served with the Suffolk County Sheriff's Office and was an Assistant Chief with the Nesconset Volunteer Fire Dept., before moving upstate to the small farming community of Moravia, NY. I worked with the Cayuga County Sheriff's Office, and was Captain of the High Angle Rescue Team, helping lost hunters, hikers, injured snowmobilers and skiers from the mountains and state parks.

I enlisted in the military in 1966 and after basic training was stationed with the U.S.Army in Darmstadt, Germany. My assignment was working as a Huey helicopter door gunner flying missions that were supporting a US geological weather survey team in the mountainous region of Austria.

I am a Certified Professional Life Coach and a Certified National Support Specialist. I have studied at the Army's Palo Alto, California in-patient PTSD clinic. I have started many programs like the Equine PTSD Therapy Program and the Return to Flight Aviation Program to help Brevard veterans cope with PTSD and other issues. I am a former two term VFW District Commander supervising 13 posts in Brevard and Osceola Counties with over 12,300 members.

I am also the author of the bestselling book "Back from the Front" a book relating to military PTSD, which enjoys sales in 24 countries, and is used by organizations such as the Israeli Defense Ministry, and the Argentine National Gendarmerie (Border Patrol). I am currently a BVC Board Member and Chairman of the Governess Committee here at the center.

I am also proud of my present assignment of being Chairman of Brevard Sheriff Ivey's Swat Veteran Negotiating Team. I am also joined by VMC Members Dorothy Walsh, Paul Julian, Chip Hanson, Amanda Herrnkind, Christine Tate, and Bob Doyle on this extraordinary team.

As the 2024-2025 Chairman, I will strive to assist all veterans and their families. I now spend many hours a week in the bush delivering food, tents and other equipment while homeless

veterans wait for their Hud-Vash Vouchers for housing. My most treasured and successful projects is the Equine Health and wellness program for veterans with PTSD. Our farm is adjacent to the Cape Canaveral National Cemetery.

Ted Suzor for Brevard Veterans Council Chairman

Hello There, Just a note to let everyone know that I will be running again this year for Chairman. I know I didn't get much done this year. I had some health things I had to take care of. Now that's behind me I look forward to a better year. So with that said I will step up to the plate And take care of things like I should.

Ray Norman for Brevard Veterans Council Director

Before the current Brevard Veterans Center, memorial park, and physical plant became a reality, the Brevard Veterans Center was housed in a small structure. My association with the Brevard Veterans Center began around 1986, before the memorial plaza, aircraft displays, and museum addition.

At that time, there was a small library and a co-located museum...that was a long time ago. As chairman, I signed a \$26 check to lease the park from the Brevard County Parks and Recreation. This lease expires in 2026. Over time, I held various offices. Fortunately, with subsequent leadership and the support of many, we were able to add the physical plant you see today.

One of my later contributions was a financial forecast that covered several walls. The subsequent leadership utilized this contribution and have since moved on to other forecasting procedures. Currently, I serve as a Sunday afternoon docent and assist with public relations and publicity.

One of my activities involves the recovery of past veterans in lost graves, including a Tuskegee Airman and his wife, and more recently, a WWII veteran.

I am running for the open BVC Director in the upcoming general membership election. I was a Veteran's Memorial Center (VMC) Librarian, Director and now the VMC Vice President. At this point, I would like to work on the "other side of the house" by more directly supporting Veteran's in need.

Finally, I also have been a part of Joe Fossi's "Veteran's Back to Class" program that have presented "patriotic" topics in various Brevard Public Schools.

If I am elected a BVC Director, I will work with Don & Dorothy Pearsall and our other non-profit "partners" to attempt to "make the vote of support on June 12, 2024. load lighter" for our local disadvantaged and "in-crisis" Veterans. In particular, I would determine how our BVC can become more involved in the suicide-prevention organization "Firewatch".

Memorial Day Ceremonies All Around Brevard County

There were five major Memorial Day Ceremonies this year all over Brevard County. They were perhaps the best attended such ceremonies in several years, with one at the Cape Canaveral National Cemetery reporting about 750 observers and about 300 at several others. Two were videoed and put on the web while media in other forms covered them all.

The weekend began on Friday, 24 May at Erdman Automotive in Cocoa with about 50 watching a moving ceremony. It included guest speakers from, Space Coast Honor Flight (Christine Tate), the US CoastGuard (CDR Sarah Brennan), the AVET Project (Garren Cone) and Gold Star Mom, artist and author (Jeanne Weaver). In addition to a great contingent from Erdman, local VFW, American Legion, MOAACC and VMC veterans also came out. The complete event is available to see on line at spacecoastdaily.com Friday night lights.

There were four big events on Memorial Day itself on 27 May which took place from Melbourne to Mims as well as many smaller ceremonies at various veteran and civic locations. The Liberty Bell Museum saw over 250 attend their annual ceremony with Naval Ordnance Test Unit Commander, CAPT Jason Schneider and Gold Star Dad Donn Weaver as guest speakers. The ceremony included reading the names and tolling the bell for each of the 22 Brevard connected military members who lost their lives in combat since 9/11. That remembrance was repeated at the Cocoa Riverfront Park that evening.

The Veterans Memorial Center held a moving ceremony with about 300 attending. Keynote speaker was LTC Tim Thomas, USA (Ret) offering his thoughts about the day and his combat experiences including the loss of his soldiers. The guest speaker was Herman Cole, COL (Ret), a Tuskegee graduate who spoke of his experiences in the service and what Memorial Day means to all of us. The invocation was presented by Pastor J.B. Please note that ALL women veteran luncheons and activities are free for the veterans. We are able to do that with the support of the BVC/VMC and our awesome community partners.



New Gift Certificate Program

A real busy month of May. It seems more and more veterans and families are becoming at-risk or on the verge of being homeless. Our new Gift Certificate program is starting to come alive, after an expected period of socialization and getting the word out to those who need it.

Our gift certificates are distributed to organizations such as the DAV and other select groups, so If a veteran in need, wants quality merchandise from a thrift store, we give them a gift certificate that allows them to visit four area thrift stores to get what they need. Most of the time its household goods, and small appliances.

At the end of the month, we visit, collect all the certificates and pay the thrift store for what they gave the veteran. We are strict with our screening process and no cash is given back to the veteran. We work closely with the Homeless Outreach Program with the Veterans Administration at the Viera Out-Patient Clinic

The Experimental Aircraft Association's (EAA) national program began back in 1992. https://www.eaa.org/eaa/youth/free-ye-flights. This national program originated in Oshkosh, Wisconsin with a goal of introducing one million children to aviation before the 100th anniversary of the Wright Brothers' first flight. EAA achieved that goal and decided to carry the program forward where today, 32 years later, they have given 2.3 million children this free, fully insured introduction to aviation.

Locally, EAA Chapter 724's pilots https://chapters.eaa.org/eaa724/about-us---officers have flown nearly 8,900 children as part of an introduction to aviation. This May 11th event was the second annual event sponsored by EAA Chapter 724 dedicated to these special children. We believe EAA Chapter 724's specific effort for these particular children is unique in the nation.

These children learned about aircraft safety, avionics and were flown for approximately 30-40 minutes over Merritt Island, Port Canaveral, the Banana River, and the Indian River Lagoon. Chapter 724 honors these children with wonderfully positive and safe experiences. May 11th was a beautiful day for each of these children.

The Patriot Report

Disabled American Veterans (DAV), Space Coast Chapter 123, Inc.

Meet Your Service Officer William J. Grooten III Commander DAV Space Coast Chapter #123 Lt. Col. USAF (Retired)

My USAF career started two days after I turned seventeen. On March 19th, I was on a Lockheed Constellation ("Connie") flying to basic training at Lackland AFB, Texas. Three hot's and a cot; basic training was great! The first meal was pancakes, medium rare. Drill Instructor said you took them you eat them. Never ate another pancake for 20 years.



After basic training, I was sent to Lowry AFB, Denver, Colorado and trained as a Airbourne Camera Repairman. After graduation, I was assigned to Fairchild AFB, Spokane, Washington, a Strategic Air Command (SAC) base. The "Cuban

Missile Crisis" was my first military action. Fairchild was the western SAC consolidation base with some 90 B-52s which were loaded with nuclear weapons and made ready to respond to any Russian threat. I Helped load and launch 90 B-52s along with many other west coast SAC bases. Security forces brought coffee and donuts in the early morning, and I used a 50-megaton nuke bomb as a table. It looked like a large 55-gallon drum on its side.

I experienced multiple assignments in England, California, Florida, and Mississippi. First England assignment was RAF Wethersfield, Braintree, Essex where I worked on F-100s. I had guard duty one night and F-100s were on nuclear alert. A Captain tried to cross into alert area, and I challenged him and chambered a round in my weapon. The Security forces heard it and with whip antennas and flashing lights, came to his rescue. Don't think he ever forgave me and I'm not sure if I would have shot him. My final enlisted assignment was in Missouri as an academic instructor at the Air Force Communications Command NCO Academy. Another story: As a MSgt I was eligible for promotion to SMSgt. General Sadler, Commander AFCC came down to present SMSgt stripes and three of our instructors who were promoted. They all held master's degrees. I challenged the General that I thought it would be easier to make 2nd Lieutenant. He asked me if I wanted to be a 2nd Lieutenant and (mouth overloaded my butt!) I said yes: Sixty days later I was in Officer's Training School.

My first Officer assignment was as the Range Support Officer (RSO) at Cape Kennedy, responsible for aural warning on the shuttle pads and High Frequency (HF) radios and antennas for the range. I completed my tour after STS-1. My next Officer assignment was as a MAC IG Inspector and did a two-year rotation inspecting all MAC bases worldwide. Upon completion of that tour, I was sent to Senior Communications Officer Course at Keesler

AFB, Mississippi and I also attained a Master Degree at University of Southern Mississippi.

After that I was assigned to NATO AWACS (Airbourne Warning And Control System) at SHAPE (Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe) Belgium and flew as crew-dog out of Geilenkirchen, Germany.

After that assignment, I was sent to MacDill AFB as the J-6 (The Joint Staff J6 provides expertise in support of all domains to enable a globally integrated Combined/Joint Force) initial cadre and stand up of U.S. Special Operations Command.



Command assignments included 1970th Ccmmunications Squadron in Woomera, South Australia. Story; Final military action: I was on the radar scope with an operator and identified the first scud launch for Desert Storm. I alerted a Patriot Missile unit in the AOR (Area of Responsibility) within 2 minutes, and they confirmed the kill. My final assignment was to the 57th Communications Group (15thCS "Voice of the Pacific"), Hickam AFB, Hawaii, I retired from the Air FORCE ON 1 July 1996 at Hickam AFB, Hawaii, as the USAF Senior Communicator in the Pacific. I served a total 35 Years, 3 months, 11 days as enlisted and officer and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Planning Ahead for a Burial in a DVA Cemetery

The National Cemetery Administration (NCA) manages 155 national cemeteries and has provided a finial resting place for more than 4.1 million Veterans. The NCA has assisted millions of Veterans and their families in arranging burials at a national cemetery. Due to a preneed eligibility application, Veterans and their spouses no longer have to wait until the Veterans passes to find out if they are eligible for burial in a national cemetery, or for memorial benefits such as a headstone, flat marker, or bronze medallion for use in private cemeteries.

Pre-need applications require all the relevant dates, discharge character, and rank information. This type of information is commonly found on a DD14 or other separation documents. If you do not have discharge documents, NCA staff or your friendly Disabled American Veterans (DAV) Service Officer's OR Any Veterans Service Organization will help obtain the required information needed to determine eligibility.

Determining your eligibility to be buried in a DVA national cemetery before you pass on can make it much easier on your survivors when that time arrives. Burial in a cemetery associated with the Department of Veterans Affairs is important to many Veterans. It honors their military service, and it may decrease the cost of their funeral.

Moreover, jumping through the DVA's eligibility determination hoops can be a daunting task for grieving survivors. The Veteran can make that task much easier by obtaining a Pre-Need Determination of Eligibility for Burial in a DVA National Cemetery. For those who choose to go this route, you can obtain this document online at www.va.gov/burials-and-memorials/pre-need/form-10007-apply-for-eligibility/introduction.

You are correct in what you're thinking. The DVA could have worked a little harder to come up with a wordier website, but for some reason they chose not to.

Generally, Veterans, service members, spouses and certain children might be eligible for burial in a DVA national cemetery. However, a Veteran and his dependance are disqualified from burial in a national cemetery if he/she received a dishonorable discharged. Spouses are eligible to be buried even if they remarry after the Veteran dies. Minor children and certain unmarried adult children are eligible also.

The DVA requires form 40-10007 and documentation to verify your eligibility. Verifying your eligibility in advance

Dept of Veteran Affairs requires form 40-10007 and documentation to verify your eligibility.

will make it easier for your survivors. If you are prepaying for your funeral arrangements, it will also help to plan what you are paying for.

Completing the form in advance is optional and if the Veteran has not done so his survivors must present his DD Form 214 to the funeral director who can plan to have the Veteran buried in a DVA national cemetery.
