VMC President's Report

The Cocoa Beach Regional Chamber of Commerce held their annual *Space Coast* HONORS awards program on Friday, September 20th and the Veterans Memorial Center was honored as the **Non-Profit Business of the Year for 2024!** This is the first time since the Brevard Veterans Council and the Veterans Memorial Center has received one of these awards. **CONGRATULATIONS VMC!!!!**

One more month left in the Hurricane season so let us see if Milton is the last to impact us. The eye of Milton passed directly over our heads on the night of October 9th, and we were fortunate that we did not have more damage. See pictures in this Courier of the minimal damage but it did require a lot of clean up. Charles and I were on site the morning after the eye passed overhead and there was debris everywhere. The county turned out that day to pick up debris as they did in all the parks. Thanks to Charles and Thomas who cleaned up most of the debris over the next few days. We closed the VMC and park from noon on the 8th through Sunday the 13th. Charles and I opened the Gray hall for the Space Coast Jazz Society to hold their scheduled Sunday performance. The turnout was smaller than usual, but everyone enjoyed the Jazz session.

Charles pointed out that we had two good sized **Green Buttonwood trees** that were planted too close to the water and toppled into the lake. See my story on how we saved the trees.

By the time this issue of the Courier is published, we will have had the **groundbreaking** of our long sought-after **Amphitheater** in the Park. As I write this, we are planning for the event, sponsored by **Brevard County Parks and Recreation Department**, **Directed by Mary Ellen Donner**. She and her crew did an outstanding job sprucing up the VMC Park for the event. We are expecting several dignitaries and the general public to attend, and I am estimating attendance to be around 400. There will be twelve gold shovels in the hands of those individuals who contributed to bringing this dream to fruition. Thanks to **Donn Weaver** and **Dean Schaaf** for their tireless efforts over the last five years working with the **Merritt Island Redevelopment Agency (MIRA)** and **County** and **State** officials to finally make this happen. **Ivey Construction** is the lead contractor and were on-site Friday, October 25th with the plans and initial inspections of the construction areas.

During construction in the Park, there will be no access to the park from the main parking lot. Entrance will be from the gate on Fortenberry during the first phase and from the west parking lot the rest of the time. The general public will only have access to the park from the west parking lot and over the bridge between the lakes. The pavilion, playground, exercise, and the raider challenge areas should be accessible unless the workers are running electricity to those areas. The users of the park will see major interruptions to their regular routines of walking or jogging along the walkways for several months. Be patient and courteous during the construction phase.

With Veterans Day approaching on November 11, the VMC will be involved in several events around the county. We will participate in an inaugural Veterans Day parade in Cape Canaveral on Saturday, November 9th. Our Veterans Day Ceremony, Monday, November 11 starting at 0930 and referenced elsewhere in this issue. Thanks to Don Pearsall and Donn Weaver for planning this year's event.

Please read our highly informative Courier and thanks to all that contribute great articles on a regular basis. And thanks particularly to **Kristi Blanchard**, our secretary, and Information Technology expert for all her efforts in getting it out on time.

Finally, I want to thank all volunteers for keeping the Center operating and for your dedication. God bless our fallen heroes, MIAs, and POWs and God bless our armed forces.

Council Report

Man, what a change of the weather since those two hurricanes rolled through. I love sleeping with the windows open. Fall is upon us and so are many events you may be interested in volunteering for or at least attending. Please look at Donn Weavers Calendar of events in this issue.

Last Tuesday I was invited to the woman veteran luncheon, where myself, Dean and Donn were among the honorees, accepting their appreciation for our support with a certificate and lunch. This group, falling under the Brevard Veterans Council was started a few years ago by Dorothy Walsh with help from Donn Weaver then the BVC chairman. This group was an instant success, and is growing each event.

In today's military, the percentage of women is 17.5% of the active duty force, and 21.6% of the selected reserve. For many years, this group of veterans were forgotten. At that time, they were mostly found in support roles. Not anymore, the shift to combat roles is evident in all branches of the military. We find them as aircraft carrier captains, jet fighter pilots, and other jobs that were always held by men. No longer forgotten, the Brevard Veterans Council is proud of its support and participation in programs for these dedicated American Veterans.

I am back from Florida's west coast my service with the VFW Disaster Response and Recovery Team ending. These unfortunate people lost either something, or everything. In areas, the storm surge washed over the swamps, leaving dangerous situations with snakes, turtles and frogs in homes and yards. It was a double economic hit for beachside communities. Many beach homes were lost, those homes were rented by snowbirds. Now, they have no place to go and the homeowner has to refund their money in addition to losing their home. We are fortunate to live on the east coast, where ocean temperatures are cooler than the Gulf, allowing many hurricanes to develop and landfall somewhere in the three state region.

Chaplain's Corner

The most powerful weapon the citizens of the United States of America have is to vote. Election day this year is November 5th so get out and vote!

A brief history of voting rights in America is as follows:

- August 2, 1776: The Declaration of Independence frames Voters' Rights - In the Declaration of Independence, signed on this day, Thomas Jefferson writes, "Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed."
- June 21, 1788: Voting Left to States in the U.S. Constitution was adopted on this date, but instead of a federal requirement, it grants states the power to establish standards for voting rights. As a result, males, who own property and are older than 21, are the only group allowed to vote. Article II establishes the Electoral College.
- July 9, 1868: Citizenship Granted to All US-born and Naturalized - Following the 13th Amendment, which prohibits slavery, the 14th Amendment is ratified, granting citizenship to all people "born or naturalized in the United States" and "equal protection under the laws," including formerly enslaved people.
- February 3, 1870: Black Men were Granted the Right to Vote -The 15th Amendment is ratified, granting Black men the right to vote and congress the power to enforce the right. However, laws, including poll taxes, literacy tests, and grandfather clauses, are enacted in mostly Southern states, suppressing Black voting rights until 1965.
- August 18, 1920: Women Get the Right to Vote After decades of protest and struggles for change, the 19th Amendment is adopted, granting American women the right to vote: "The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex. Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."
- June 2, 1924: Native Americans were Granted the Right to Vote - Congress enacted the Indian Citizenship Act, granting the right to vote to Native Americans born in the United States. Despite its passage, some states continue to bar Native Americans from voting.
- 1943 Chinese Exclusion Act Ends "We do not have government by the majority. We have government by the majority who participate." - Thomas Jefferson

Book Report: Blind Man's Bluff: The Untold Story of American Submarine Espionage

Book Report by H.V. Rhodes

At times, Blind Man's Bluff reads like a war epic, as the narrative follows sailors from their antics at their favored stateside watering holes to the deadly serious execution of their missions on the opposite side of the world. Essentially, the book is a war epic, chronicling the covert undersea operations carried out by the U.S. Navy- primarily the submarine force- against the Soviet Union during the Cold War. Although the official version of these operations remains classified, the authors have gathered extensive data from open sources, including the personal recollections of some of the participants, several of whom were former sailors of the Soviet Fleet.

Spanning the era from the late 1940s to the early 1990s, the authors document trailing operations between submarines of the opposing nations, the partial recovery of a sunken Soviet submarine from the depths of the mid-Pacific, and electronic taps on undersea military communication cables.


Also covered are the losses suffered by the U.S. and the Soviets, most notably 99 crewmen aboard the USS Scorpion (SSN-589) which sank mysteriously in the mid-Atlantic in May 1968.

The only issue of note to this reviewer is how the authors minimize the greater context of the Cold War, treating it in a detached fashion, as if this conflict was simply a match between two chess grandmasters – impressive but of little impact beyond the playing surface. The reality is that the Cold War was a half-century struggle between a flawed system of government (Democracy) and a terribly toxic one (Communism) with

profound consequences for humanity.

This book is recommended for anyone interested in discovering a little-known aspect of the Cold War. Given the recent increase in tension between the United States and the Russian Federation, this topic may be more relevant than ever.

After speaking with several women veterans, they agreed that a mentor program to help women veterans transition from military to civilian life is something that is needed. I and several retired officers are creating a very detailed program along with parameters for mentors and mentees. We expect to roll this out at the beginning of 2025.

Last but not least our ladies had a very special treat during October - thanks to Bob Boswell and Marvin Juhl, Tico's new leadership, a group of our women veterans received a guided tour of the Tico Warbird Museum, free of charge. Storms Change Schedules but Not Focus — JROTC Raider Challenge Meets in 2024

Two Hurricanes, Helene and Milton, forced changes and the cancellation of one Raider Challenge Meet in Brevard at the Veterans Memorial Center Park this Fall, but the cadets never lost spirit.

More than 250 JROTC cadets from 11 High Schools (including two from other counties) competed in the once postponed Raider Challenge event on 5 October. The event saw over 400 parents and siblings watch the five grueling events, which include a 2K run, Big Tire Flip, Rope Bridge crossing, Drag and Carry relay, and Litter Carry competition with 10 person teams fighting time and skill requirements. 29 Male, female and mixed teams did their best, with Merritt Island and Cocoa Beach High School teams winning the most trophies, but all giving their best and using teamwork, leadership, motivation and athleticism and much more to high levels — unusual actions for most high school students on a Saturday morning.

A second Raider Challenge for later in October had to be cancelled due to Hurricane Milton and scheduling conflicts. The final District Championship is all set for 02 November at the VMC Park, from 0900 -1200. VMC members are encouraged to come out and support the JRIOTC cadets and help present dozens of medals, ribbons and trophies to the winners, many of whom hope to qualify for the State Raider Challenge Championships on 16 Nov. The awards are funded by MOAACC's Good Deeds Foundation.
