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The council has been involved with many cases this past month assisting veterans and their families. Networking is an important part of the mission we share with the Brevard Memorial Center. Dean and I attended the last Military Affairs Council (MAC) held at the Cocoa Civic Center. It's surprising how many organizations all work together to assist the military both active and veteran. The MAC part of the area Cocoa Beach Regional Chamber of Commerce now re-named Accelerate Brevard: Chamber of Innovation. The membership is largely made up of businesses from all areas of the county. There is much interest and excitement about major projects within our area, such as the new hospital, the new bridge on Sea Ray Drive and of course the new amphitheater being built on our own turf.

Speaking of which, I have been attending meetings with the county, Ivey Construction and Dean and Donn at their construction trailer out back. It's hard to imagine the size until they start going vertical, and we can get a sense of the size. Concrete footers have been poured for the concession stand and much of the initial grading is completed. The electrical and plumbing is well under way. The back of the amphitheater has a large parking lot for stage equipment trucks and parking area for performers, plus restrooms and dressing rooms.

This addition to Merritt Island is being overseen by Merritt Island Redevelopment (MIRA) who are doing a fine job of promoting this project.





## Chaplain's Corner Chaplain Chip Hanson USMC (Fmr)

The rate of suicide among veterans ticked upwards in recent years despite increased public attention and funding on the problem, according to a new report released by Department of Veterans Affairs officials on Thursday. Veterans' suicides made up about 14 percent of total suicides in America in 2018. VA officials have emphasized in recent years that mental health challenges and suicidal thoughts are not a problem specific to the veteran's community.

"Findings documented in this report highlight the continuing and increasing problem of suicide among U.S. adults and among veterans, and the need for ongoing efforts to improve methods of suicide risk mitigation," the report stated. In a statement, VA Secretary Robert Wilkie said that despite the lack of overall progress in suicide prevention among veterans, the report does show some areas of improvement.

"The data shows the rate of suicide among veterans who recently used VA health services has decreased, an encouraging sign as the department continues its work and shares what we learn with those who care for and about veterans," he said. The rate of suicide among veterans who recently received some type of VA care decreased was down 2.4 percent from 2017 to 2018. For veterans with no connection to VA care, it increased 2.5 percent.

Tucked in the middle of the November/December 2021 issue of DAV Magazine is an article that deserves some extra focus from our members at chapters and departments nationwide. Titled "Anybody can do it," the article highlights how Chapter 30 in Mountain Home, Arkansas used a grant from DAV's Columbia Trust for its suicide prevention program, which contributed to a dramatic decrease in the epidemic in their local county.

The reason for this renewed focus is twofold. First, the article spotlights one of the National Service Foundation's most underutilized programs and the Trust's role as a catalyst in bridging resources from well-populated chapters and departments to others in need. Second, and more importantly, it bestows the recognition that Chapter 30 deserves for tackling and making a notable difference in an issue that plagues the veteran community, one that will remain Wilkie's highest priority as national commander.

All members of the Library Team are committed to continuous improvement in the services we provide to our customers. In most cases, these improvements should be transparent, in that the customers need not and will not take any notice.

There is, however, one area of improvement we do wish to bring to attention of the community. This is the establishment of a new subsection: "Guidance for Vets & Families." This subsection is found on the west wall (to the right upon entering the library) and are cataloged as "MiscG." We expect this section will grow over time. It is our hope that, in conjunction will all the other initiatives by the BVMC community to help our fellow veterans, the literature on this particular book shelf will be informative and inspiring.

In January 2025 (the most recent month for which data is available), the library hosted 110 visitors and issued 25 items (books or DVDs).

There have been several recent additions to WWII, Vietnam and Joint Military Aviation sections.

Finally, we note the addition of the "Raiding Forces" series, authored by Phil Ward, an Army Ranger with combat experience. This is a series of novels centered on an American Special Operator in WWII.



## Book Report: "Nam" written by Mark Baker

Nam, written by Mark Baker is a graphic, oral account of experiences throughout the Vietnam War. It is a fresh and insightful perspective of stories the author put together after extensive interviews. The detailed narration in Nam has the reader on edge for the next page. This book is a raw and unfiltered war log of the Vietnam War experience told from the perspective of the various men and women involved.

We can identify with the characters through Baker's clever language and expression. The use of jargon is exquisite. The humor is priceless. For example, when I read "he was the top banana" and that marine "looked like a rock" I couldn't help but giggle a little.

Nam is personal and intimate, from the draft to deployment and the return home, throughout the Vietnam War. Baker does a good job of detailing isolated instances and situations so that the reader feels life and death, and all the horrors of war through the eyes of the narrator. These hardcore accounts collected together are hard to come by and anyone interested in the Vietnam War should not hesitate to pick up a copy of Nam by Mark Baker and start reading.

## Museum Updates

#### "Buffalo Soldier" U.S. Army Cavalrymen 1870's

Buffalo Soldiers originally were members of the 10th Cavalry Regiment of the United States Army, formed on September 21, 1866, at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. This nickname was given to the Colored Cavalry by Native American tribes who fought in the Indian Wars. The term eventually became synonymous with all of the African-American regiments formed after the Civil War in 1866:

9th Cavalry Regiment 10th Cavalry Regiment 24th Infantry Regiment 25th Infantry Regiment Second 38th Infantry Regiment

During the peacetime formation years (1865-1870), the black infantry and cavalry regiments were composed of black enlisted soldiers commanded by white commissioned officers and black noncommissioned officers. These included the first commander of the 10th Cavalry Benjamin Grierson, the first commander of the 9th Cavalry Edward Hatch, Medal of Honor recipient Louis H. Carpenter, and Nicholas M. Nolan. The first black commissioned officer to lead the Buffalo Soldiers and the first black graduate of West Point, was Henry O. Flipper in 1877.



#### **Indian Wars**

From 1867 to the early 1890s, these regiments served at a variety of posts in the Southwestern United States and the Great Plains regions. They participated in most of the Indian Wars campaigns in these areas and earned a distinguished record. Thirteen enlisted men and six officers from these four regiments earned the Medal of Honor during the Indian Wars. Park Rangers

Another little-known contribution of the Buffalo Soldiers involved eight troops of the 9th Cavalry Regiment and one company of the 24th Infantry Regiment who served in California's Sierra Nevada as some of the first national park rangers. In 1899, Buffalo Soldiers from Company H, 24th Infantry Regiment briefly served in Yosemite National Park, Sequoia National Park, and General Grant (Kings Canyon) National Parks.

## Park and Plaza Report By Donn Weaver

February was a very busy month not only for the huge construction project underway inside Veterans Memorial Park, but also in our beautiful plaza. The following information highlights some changes.

BRICKS: Eleven Bricks were added to the plaza including seven near the Elmore Bech under the Huey Helicopter. More are coming this month in an effort to surpass Dr Richard Elmore, prof emeritus at FIOT with this new bench and section to honor his amazing service as a dust-off helicopter pilot during two tours in Vietnam. This is a fitting time to do so as 29 March marks the 50th Anniversary of our withdrawal from Saigon.

**BENCHES:** A new tech was received and assembled with a unique theme. A widow donated for the Bench one sign showing her husband in military gear five decades ago, and the other showing a recent photo taken just before he died in 2020. Like, any benches outside the museum this one will be installed in the completed VMP in November (if the project holds to schedule) and be placed near a Memorial Tree.

**TREES:** Twenty-four trees have been funded as a donation, and we learned this month that the Park plans call for forty-four live oaks to be planted so there will be chances for more purchases in the future. Check the library, museum or foyer for applications for trees, bricks and benches, all donations help us (minus product cost) to continue our operations and maintain the plaza and more.

**MONUMENT TO ALLIES:** Check out the February metal scrubbing and repainting of the Plaza monument closest to the aircraft. The Vietnam Unforgettable Memories Foundation funded the upgrade, and we made plans for biannual polishing given the high toll taken on such metals used near the coast. **PARK:** As of the end of February the project moved two weeks ahead of schedule with milestones of pouring cement for the Amphitheater and Concession Building slated for early March. Soon our website will include Timelapse photos of the progress courtesy of Roger Scruggs, our VMC Photographer. Last month we also worked with the county, MIFA and CAMI to choose the Christmas Tree for the Park that will be illuminated starting in early December 2025. It will be a Community Tree but also dedicated as a Gold Star Family Christmas Tree with plans in the works to raise funds for an appropriate sign/marker near the tree.

## **Ceremony Honors and Remembers the Four Immortal Chaplains of WWII and All Chaplains**

On 02 February about sixty people attended a very special ceremony at the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center (VMC). The solemn program began with the Brevard Marine Corps League Detachment 513 telling the story of four Army Chaplains of different faiths who gave their life jackets and more to save other soldiers. Their troop transport ship was attacked on the night of 03/04 Feb off the coast of Greenland by German U Boats and sunk in less than two hours into the icy North Atlantic.

After the war, the 4 Immortal Chaplains Foundation began at the Chapel of the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard. Its mission has been to remember every year the heroic efforts of these four men who left their churches and a synagogue to join the Army as Chaplains in 1942. After they shared all they had to save others, they linked arms in a unity of different faiths and were swallowed by the sea. Some of the few survivors saw their actions and the four were eventually awarded congressional gold medals.

The Marines read their names and bio while lighting a memory candle and placing a symbolic life vest on three crosses and the Star of David. MCL Commandant Rick Bedford served as MC as the Martens presented colors, carried the life vests and played TAPS.

This year seven Chaplains were also recognized for their service 82 years later and stood behind the photos of the Immortal Four as their bios were read. With over 150 years as chaplains or in other ministry, they too have served and are rarely recognized for their crucial roles, which began when George Washington requested Chaplains be assigned to the Continental Army in 1775.

The Chaplains on 02 Feb: Bill Adams, Tom Unrath, JB Krump, Chip Hanson, Ann Taylor, Bob Doyle and Nelson Riviera.

Donn Weaver, VMC VP read their names and told about some special Chaplain stories, including a report from the current Chief of all 2800 Chaplains in the US Army, MG Bill Green. He noted the Army Chaplains have unity of purpose though they come from, and represent 110 faith groups.

In 2019 the Philadelphia based Four Immortal Chaplains Foundation officially added the monument at the VMC plaza designed by Gold Star Mom Jeanne Weaver into their registry. The monument also recalls the missions of all military chaplains from the Revolution to the War on Terror.

For the VMC the historic connection to this sad by inspiring event in 1943 is moire than just a remembrance once a year. Please check out the monument in the VMC Plaza and the Chaplains Display in the second floor of the VMC Military Museum. We

hope next year many more will come to learn about the Four Immortal Chaplains and the very special role in times of fear, danger, stress, family crises and combat/other deaths performed by all Chaplains.

#### National Vietnam War Veterans Day - March 29th

National Vietnam War Veterans Day is the first of four national holidays that recognize those veterans that are serving and have served and sacrificed for our country. They include - Memorial Day- Purple Heart Day and Veterans Day.

President Nixon in 1974 declared March 29th as National Vietnam Veterans Day to coincide with the total withdrawal of US combat forces from Vietnam.

President George W. Bush signed the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008 which included the authorization to recognize the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War.

President Barack Obama in 2012 issued a new presidential proclamation to commemorate the sou, anniversary of the Vietnam War.

In 2017 the date of the holiday was set as March 29th by President Donald Trump and officially known as National Vietnam War Veterans Day.

March 29th was chosen because this was the day the United States Military Assistance Command I Vietnam MACN was DISESTABLISHED, and the last troops left Vietnam. The last combat soldier to leave Vietnam was Master Sargent Max Beilke. The last COMBAT UNIT - 3rd Battalion 21"1 Infantry departed Da Nang RVN on August 111\ 1972. This officially ended Americas participation in the Vietnam ground war.

'In-Country' after March 29th, 1973, were approximately 100 Marines assigned to Embassy duty.

On April 30th• 1973..\_ the last Marine, Msg. Juan Jose Valdez, boarded the final chopper and left the roof of the US Embassy 2 hours before Saigon fell.

The American soldiers' objectives in Vietnam were to keep South Vietnam a Free and Democratic Society and from being occupied by Communist North Vietnam.

The Vietnam Veteran participated in 9 years of ground combat and did not lose a major battle. America's objectives were realized while its troops were deployed.

When the United States began to cease ground combat operations in 1972, there were fewer than 70,000 troops stationed "in-country" as compared to 1969 which saw over 540,000 troops deployed. Total Vietnam "In-Country" (boots on the ground) troops during the Vietnam War were 2,700,000. The last VIETNAM COMBAT VETERAN left country on March291h,1973.

American combat forces left Vietnam 25 months before the South Vietnamese Army was overwhelmed by North Vietnam on April 301\ 1975, and Saigon fell.

Congress, refusing to honorthe Paris Peace Accords, lost "American Objectives" in Vietnam on April301h, 1975, with the Fall of Saigon. American Objectives that began in the 1950's under President Dwight Eisenhour. A WAR WAS NOT LOST -AMERICAN OBJECTIVES were LOST; the American combat soldier had left Vietnam 25 months before the fall of Saigon. However, coverage of the fall stated that "America had lost the war" and that stigma was unjustly attributed to the Vietnam Veteran.

The American soldier did not lose the fighting war in Vietnam, they had won. This fact has been lost to history.

On 23 February 1945, the first flag ever raised on Japanese soil was on Mt Suribachi on the island of Iwo Jima. The flag was only 55.5 inches by 28.5 inches. It was photographed by Marine Sgt. Lou Lowery. It could barely be seen from the ships offshore, so a second flag, 96 inches by 56 was ordered to be brought up. Civilian AP photographer Joe Rosenthal was in the right place at the right time and took the most iconic picture of all time.

On 23 February 2025, members of the Brevard County Detachment of the Marine Corps League on Merritt Island hosted a get together at the Beef O'Brady's of Melbourne in honor and remembrance of those whose shoulders we the Marines of today who stand upon and carry on their legacy.


