November 1, 1955 - April 30, 1975

April 30 marks the 50th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War. I served as a combat Marine from 1967 to 1969. This article is dedicated to my brothers who never came home, those who returned to a nation that turned its back on us, and those who later took their own lives.

The U.S. has fought in many conflicts. WWII (1941–1945) was a decisive victory, followed by the rebuilding of Japan and Germany into industrial powers. In the early 1950s, we fought in Korea—the "Forgotten War." With U.S. help, South Korea became a strong, industrialized nation.

In the 1960s, we went to war in Vietnam—but this time, we left before completing our mission. Unlike Japan, Germany, and South Korea, Vietnam's post-war development never reached the same level. The difference? In WWII and Korea, we finished the job. In Vietnam, we were not allowed to.

#### A Brief History of the Vietnam War

In 1955, President Eisenhower pledged support to South Vietnam. U.S. military and CIA assistance helped South Vietnam crack down on communist sympathizers. President Kennedy, guided by the "domino theory," increased aid but avoided large-scale military involvement. By 1962, U.S. troop presence reached 9,000.

Under President Johnson, Cold War fears and regional strategy prompted deeper involvement. After attacks on the USS Maddox and Turner Joy in the Gulf of Tonkin, Congress passed the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, granting Johnson broad war powers.

1965: Operation Rolling Thunder, a sustained bombing campaign, began in response to Viet Cong attacks. Soon after, the first U.S. ground troops arrived, initially to defend air bases—but quickly became engaged in combat.

#### 1968:

The Battle of Khe Sanh saw U.S. Marines withstand a 77-day siege.

The Tet Offensive shocked the American public, with coordinated attacks on over 100 cities. Although U.S. forces repelled the offensive, it marked a turning point and triggered the gradual withdrawal.

The Battle for Hue City forced U.S. Marines into intense urban combat, a stark contrast to previous jungle warfare.

1969: Operation Menu, a covert bombing campaign in

Cambodia, began with B-52 bombers dropping 108,823 tons of ordnance.

1973: The U.S., North Vietnam, South Vietnam, and the Viet Cong signed the Paris Peace Accords, agreeing to a ceasefire and withdrawal of U.S. forces. In return, North Vietnam released U.S. POWs. The DMZ at the 17th Parallel remained in place, with reunification to come by peaceful means.

1975:

The last U.S. combat troops departed, leaving behind 7,000 Defense Department civilians.

On April 29–30, Operation Frequent Wind evacuated over 7,000 Americans and South Vietnamese as Saigon fell.






In February 2025 (the most recent month for which data is available), the library hosted 178 visitors and issued 23 items (books or DVDs).

We received several large book collections as donations, and are in the process of assessing and cataloging what we will incorporate into the collection. The majority of these books pertain to the Vietnam War.

Our team conducted and processed one VHP interview with USMC veteran Norbert O'Hara. He was a pioneer in developing the Marines' helicopter capabilities. Among his other achievements, he was a professor, an explorer in Antarctica, and Mayor of Indialantic in the 1980s. This fascinating video is accessible from the BVMC website.

Finally, we have several interesting presentations scheduled, including "Truths and Myths About the Vietnam War" (Mar 25) and "The Treblinka Death Camp & Its Heroes" (Apr 29).



#### Book Report: The Thin Red Line by James Jones

#### Book Report by H.V. Rhodes

James Jones was the only American serviceman who witnessed the Pearl Harbor attack and went on to a literary career. He is best know as the author of the novel From Here to Eternity, which depicts peacetime Army life in Hawaii, the attack itself, and concludes with America's sudden entry into World War II.

Set during the later phase of the Guadalcanal campaign, The Thin Red Line deals with the members of an Army Infantry company from their landing in the middle of the battle, through the struggle to secure the strategic island, and eventual victory. Initially, the reader is confronted with a large number of not especially well-defined characters. The enlisted soldiers of Charlie Company gradually emerge as individuals in the course of the fighting and dying. The dialog reflects the tremendous stress of the situation with copious profanity, sexism and the casual racism of the 1940s. James Jones portrays Army officers mostly as self-serving sycophants or as bumbling incompetents. He depicts some as both.

James Jones served with the 25th Infantry Division on Guadalcanal during the Army phase (December 1942-January 1943) of this critical campaign, until he sustained a wound that resulted in his evacuation and eventual discharge, achieving the grade of Corporal. It can be safely assumed that this novel depicts the author's view of real-world events, although he acknowledges at the conclusion that another witness might tell a somewhat different story.

As one example of the author's technique, the place-names he uses to describe the battles are fictional equivalents of recognizable localities that figured prominently in the progress of the campaign, which is generally regarded as the turning point of the Pacific War.

Beyond the conflict and chronicle of casualties, the author explores deeper themes suggested by the title: The narrow boundary between life and death, between sanity and madness, between courage and cowardness. He discusses the causes and symptoms of what we now call Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). There are redemption stories that echo The Red Badge of Courage.

The Thin Red Line demands a lot from the reader but provides insight into the arena of combat that relatively few people experience first-hand in modern America. The Thin Red Line is located in the BVMC Library as Fic-Jones-01.

The VMP Goal of completion by early November 2025, seems more realistic every week.

The 82 acre Park still had plenty of room for this drill meet and the 29 March JROTC State Qualifying Drill Meet. Soon thereafter the available portions on the VMP will host two huge Easter Egg hunts in April for kids of all ages.

### History Remembered: 242nd Anniversary of Special Naval Battle of Florida Coast By Donn Weaver

Though many in Brevard County are not aware, a crucial naval battle between two American Ships supported by a French Frigate against two British Ships, took place off the SE coast of Cape Canaveral in 1783. Every year the Brevard Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) supported by the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center (BVMC) and the MOAA Cape Canaveral Chapter Good Deeds Foundation (GDF) hosts a ceremony to remember that crucial event and honor the fallen. The battle actually took place after the British surrendered at Yorktown (no internet then) but the American ships contained Spanish gold coins for crucial troop payments enroute from Mexico to New York.

This year on 15 March about 200 attended the event on a beautiful day. SAR Chapters from three states,10 Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) chapters from several Florida Chapters, and the Central Florida Children of the American Revolution (with over 80 members total) were in colonial uniforms and garb, led a parade of flags and rendered honors with wreaths. Marine Corps League Det. 513 presented the colors along with color guards from the USCG Aux, the Sea Cadets and the BVMC.
