Chaplain's Corner Chaplain Chip Hanson USMC (Fmr)

Memorial Day is a federal holiday in the United States for remembering the 1,498,240 men and women who died, and the 40,031 still missing in action, while serving in our country's Armed Forces. The holiday, which is observed each year on the last Monday of May, will be held this year on May 26, 2025. Originally, Memorial Day was observed on May 30 from 1868 to 1970 and marks the unofficial start of the summer season. Memorial Day should not be confused with Veterans Day. Memorial Day honors the men and women who died while serving, whereas Veterans Day celebrates the service of all U.S. military veterans – Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, Air Force, and now Space Force.

The Merchant Marines are not part of the U.S. Military, which is why they are not recognized on veteran holidays. (Reference: CITREP, Wikipedia, and several other publications.)

In 1868, General John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic — an organization of Union veterans founded in Decatur, Illinois — established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of Union war dead with flowers. By the 20th century, various Union and Confederate memorial traditions, once celebrated on different days, merged, and Memorial Day eventually became a day to honor all Americans who died in military service.

In 1915, following the Second Battle of Ypres, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, a physician with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, wrote the poem "In Flanders Fields." Its opening lines refer to the fields of poppies that grew among the soldiers' graves in Flanders.

In 1918, inspired by the poem, YWCA worker Moina Michael attended a YWCA Overseas War Secretaries' conference wearing a silk poppy pinned to her coat and distributed more than two dozen poppies to others present. In 1920, the National American Legion adopted the poppy as their official symbol of remembrance.

On May 26, 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson designated the "official" birthplace of Memorial Day by signing a presidential proclamation naming Waterloo, New York as the holder of the title. This action followed House Concurrent Resolution 587, in which the 89th Congress officially recognized that the patriotic tradition of observing Memorial Day had begun one hundred years earlier in Waterloo. The village credits druggist Henry C. Welles and county clerk John B. Murray as founders of the holiday, although sources such as Snopes and Live Science dispute the Waterloo account.

President John F. Kennedy once quoted:

"It is for us the living... to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced." As Scripture reminds us:

"Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends." John 15:13 (ESV)

The combined BVC-VMC Board of Directors has unanimously decided to delay the 2025-2026 election because we are very close to becoming a single 501(c)3 known as the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center. We'll keep you informed and hold elections as soon as possible. Thank you!



As of April 24, 2025, we have 23 registered Cadets. This is only two short of our goal of 25. We invite all Brevard Veterans Memorial Center members to bring their children and/or grandchildren (i.e. must be at least 10 years old) to one of our two monthly drill sessions to determine if they would be interested in joining our dynamic unit!

On Saturday, April 19th, there was a "Chief's board" held for two of our cadets. One of the two – Ms. Madilynn Penney, made it on her first try! Our other outstanding cadet was told that he will be able attend another Chiefs board in 60 days.

The remainder of our 2025 schedule until the 2025/2026 school year begins is:

- May 3– Standard drills (focus on Awards ceremony preparation)
- May 17- Standard drills (drills to be performed on CCSFS)
- May 31- Annual Awards & Graduation ceremony (see below note)
- June No drills due to cadet Advanced Training
- July -No drills due to cadet Advanced Training. Annual Fieldtrip (see below)
- August 2– First drills back from summer begin (CG BD Picnic)

The units next big event will be "by invitation only" the Courageous Division's 22nd Annual Awards and Graduation ceremony at Viera's Indian River Colony Club's Main Colony Hall on May 31, 2025. It will begin at 5:30p and is estimated to be completed by 8p. We have one graduate – soon to be Chief Madilynn Penney. Ms. Penney aspires to be a Coast Guard Officer after her graduation from college.

Finally, the unit's planned annual fieldtrip will be July 11th through July 13th. The cadets will be training at both the Kings Bay Submarine Base as well as the Mayport Naval Station.

Many of you have worked diligently to finally, after several years make this happen. VMC Librarian Report Hank Rhodes USN (Fmr)

Few of us will ever meet anyone enshrined in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. But we all have the privilege of knowing someone who first enlisted in the Navy at the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, or at least on the site. In 1973, when Paul Julian signed on, the Rock Hall was far into the future, and that location was occupied by the Naval Reserve Center in Paul's hometown of Cleveland, Ohio.



Initially rated as a Signalman, Paul's active duty time was primarily aboard USS Jason (AR-8), homeported in San Diego, California. The Jason's mission was repair of other ships in forward locations, making her essentially a floating "fix it garage." During Paul's time aboard, the Jason conducted a Western Pacific deployment with port stops in Japan. Paul continued his service in the reserves, for a total of 41 years. He transitioned from Signalman to Quartermaster (Navigation) to Operations Specialist (Radars and position-keeping).

After earning his degree in accounting at Cleveland State University, Paul pursued a career as an auditor with the Department of Defense, but was primarily engaged supporting NASA.

At the BVMC, Paul worked in the library, including several years as lead librarian until he was elected to the Executive Committee. He continues on the BOD, coordinates the library's discussion group programs, and also works the technical side of the Veterans' History Project. Additionally, he fills a leadership role with the local Naval Sea Cadet unit, and helps with Bible study at his church.

Paul has two sons and recently welcomed a granddaughter to the family.

So, our colleague Paul is the proverbial "one handshake" away from Rock and Roll immortality. With this "virtual handshake," we thank Paul for all he's done for the BVMC over the years.

Book Report: "Annapolis" by William Martin



The story of two families, the Staffords and the Parrishes, unfolds over eight generations in and around the City of Annapolis. Annapolis, founded in 1694, is the Capital of Maryland and the site of the U.S. Naval Academy since 1845. As citizens of a nation that fought for freedom, fought itself, and fought wars around the world, the Staffords and the Parrishes shed their blood for the U.S. Navy and the city that was its mecca.

"From blistering sea battles on wooden ships to the first ironclads, from the shores of Cuba and Tripoli to Pearl Harbor and Vietnam. The Staffords and the Parrishes became midshipmen and commanders, spies and pilots. And with each generation their covenant grew stronger, old grudges became deeper, and America's sea power became the most awesome in the world."

The characters are well defined and you become a part of them. The city of Annapolis grows over time, war and personal strife. The use of flashbacks are well done and spaced. The story of one house is followed through the years and wellused to tell the story of the people and the times.

BVMC May 2025 Discussion Group Series



The US Army's 250th Birthday Presentation

The Brevard Veterans Memorial Center's Discussion Group Team (DGT) will have VMC Vice President and former US Army Infantry Captain Donn Weaver make the presentation. It will be held on Tuesday, May 27, 2025, in the BVMC Library from 1800 to 1930. Water and snacks will be provided. Please come and enjoy!

The U.S. Army, the oldest service in the U.S. military, will celebrate its 250th birthday on June 14, 2025. Its birth during the beginning of the Revolutionary War is one stop along the road to America's 250th birthday on July 4, 2026.

The Army traces its origins back to 1775 when the Second Continental Congress established it to defend the newly formed colonies. Initially, it was a militia force, but it has evolved into a world-renowned fighting force, playing a vital role in the nation's growth and development. The Army's primary mission is to provide necessary forces and capabilities for combat operations, support national security, and conduct stability operations.

The Army's history is intertwined with the nation's wars and conflicts, from the American Revolutionary War to more recent engagements. It fought for independence against Great Britain, played a key role in the American Civil War, and participated in major conflicts like World War I, World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War. The Army also played a significant role in the Gulf War, the War in Iraq, and the War in Afghanistan.

Following the Cold War, the Army's focus shifted to Western Asia, and it continues to be a major component of the U.S. military, adapting to modern warfare and maintaining a global presence. The Army has undergone significant changes throughout its history, from reliance on volunteer soldiers to modern conscription, and from small peacetime forces to massive wartime deployments. Today, the Army remains a vital force, providing land dominance and supporting the nation's security.

Next Generation USID Card Announcement

Passed by Congress in 2005, the REAL ID Act enacted the 9/11 Commission's recommendation that the Federal Government "set standards for the issuance of sources of identification, such as driver's licenses." The latest information indicates the Department of Homeland Security will start Real ID Act enforcement on 7 May 2025. This will affect what forms of ID/documentation people can use to access certain federal facilities, board domestic commercial flights or individuals visiting military installations.

Even after the Real ID Act is in effect, there is no change for military base access for individuals (military retirees/dependents/ surviving spouses) who already possess military, or DoD issued credentials; non-DoD personnel without base access credentials will be the largest demographic affected by REAL ID requirements. If you don't have the NextGen ID card, but an "old style" ID card (DD Form 2, DD Form 1173, DD Form 1173-1 or DD Form 2765(blue, pink or tan ID)) you will still be able to access a base for now!

It's important for military retirees/dependents/surviving spouses to know, at some time in the future, these old forms of ID will not be valid to access a military installation, and you will need issuance of the NextGen ID card. This will be true even if your old ID card has an INDEF expiration date on it - the ID will still be invalid.

DoD has not specified a date when this will happen, and we have no idea how much advance warning you will get before you must have the NextGen ID card. Social media and word of mouth, however, you receive information, we are hearing the deadline may be on 1 Jan 2026. We understand DoD will formally announce.

Based on this, we strongly encourage everyone with an old-style ID card to get a NextGen ID card now!

There are several ways to make an appointment to get a new ID card.

- 1. You can visit the RAPIDS ID Card Office Locator website to find the closest office and either call them to make an appointment
- 2. Schedule your own appointment using the website. <u>https://idco.dmdc.osd.mil/idco/</u> To make an appointment using this site select the "ID Card Office Locator & Appointments" block.
- 3. You may be able to renew your ID card online and have it mailed to you, no waiting in line! You select the "Family ID Cards" block on the website at the link above.

Below are the requirements to renew a card online:

- Sponsor must be a CAC holder or have a DoD Self-Service Logon username/password
- Must be requesting a renewal of an active USID card
- Sponsor and Cardholder must have email addresses listed in DEERS that they have authorized DoD to use for contacting them

- Sponsor's personnel status must extend at least 30 days into the future
- Cardholder has a photo saved in DEERS taken in the last 12 years
- Cardholder's mailing address is present in DEERS and is in United States or Overseas.
- USID cards cannot be shipped to PO Boxes If you have an old-style ID card, you can get the new NextGen ID at any time - do it now!

Veterans Connections By Don Pearsall, CEO & Founder

The last few months have been rather hectic. We handled many cases, in fact, thanks to our supporters, it may have been a record. It started when we are asked by American Legion Post 332 to assist a veteran's wife with car repairs. Her Navy veteran husband was in Lake Nona Domiciliary and the family had a car that kept overheating and needed repairs. The mechanic who was going to charge almost \$900.00. said he would work with us to help bring the price down some.

After that, a Flight Attendant from Southwest Airlines contacted our office about a veteran living in the woods behind her house. We made a visit and got information about him and contacted NVHS. We gave him food, gift cards from Publix, and some other basics like a flashlight, bus passes from SCAT and other things. Meantime his case worker was contacted, while the Flight Attendant, who wished to remain anonymous, took up a collection from her airline friends and along with our financial help we put that veteran in a motel for 9 nights. We wrote a letter to Southwest commending this employee and her friends who helped this unfortunate veteran.

There are still many snowbird veterans down here needing services. On the same token, many of these veterans love to step up and help serve others too. I spoke to one veteran from Massachusetts down here for the winter. He volunteers every Monday at House of Home distributing food to people who are in need. Not all snowbird veterans need assistance, but those who do are well taken care of by the many organizations in Brevard County. We will miss many of our snowbird helpers when they return to their northern homes. We thank them while we await their return this fall.

It always seems like we are falling behind when it comes to vetting and assisting veterans. One major problem is that when a veteran needs assistance, they wait until the lights go off before they ask for help. It takes time for us to vet the individual, check their financial background and get funds in place to pay. At the same time, we are working with the veteran to see if, and how they will be able to pay the next month's bill. We remind them not to wait until the last possible minute to contact us. It is a sense of accomplishment to see a family we helped get back on their feet again and managing their own affairs. That, is what's so rewarding about this job. The VMC supported the event, but more than 230 Church volunteers did all the work set up, covering 20 fun stations for the kids and cleaning up all from 0630-1300 that day.

Georgianna Church, which has given the VMC thousands of dollars over the years and has a special granite plaque on the Memorial Plaza Wall, not only covered the rent that day but provided another generous donation.

Dr. Elmore, a combat dust-off pilot in Vietnam saved many lives and earned respect of the now 18 comrades and FIT connected former students who are creating this section to honor him. He still does not know about this great gesture which the group hopes to complete and share with him on Memorial Day Weekend. The BVMC also worked with CSpray to approve the annual maintenance and spruce up plan for the plaza. Many improvements can be seen every month.

Memorial Trees: Two more were requested, making the total 25. Good news was received when the County and Ivey Construction coordinated to approve at least 40 Florida Live Oak Memorial Trees for planting in the Park this summer, so dedication of Memorial Trees around Veterans Day is looking good.

Memorial Park Benches: Three more were ordered and assembled thanks to Charles Schaaf and Bill Pollock. They will be installed in their various positions once the Amphitheater project is completed in the late Fall.

Park Construction: Check out the late April photos below. Progress is great and on track with the Concession Stand and Restrooms already getting the slab and walls going up. The amphitheater slab is expected to be poured in early May with the steel pillar frames already going up. Roger Scruggs plans an updated drone photo next week which really best shows the scope and size if this \$8.2 M effort.

First Space Coast Honor Flight of 2025 By Donn Weaver

Very early on Saturday 5 April, about two hundred people gathered to honor and launch 30 veterans of WWII, Korea and Vietnam on their Space Coast Honor Flight (SCHF), Mission Number 81. SCHF began operations as a 501(c)3 in October 2010. When the Mission 81 veterans departed on two buses from the Wickham Park Senior Center at 0300 hours, they joined 2,098 other veterans honored for a very special day in our nation's capital. They saw 6 monuments and special events, including the changing of the guard at Arlington National Cemetery and the Women's Military Memorial.

The oldest veteran was almost 98 and fought in WWII. Five were over 90, along with many veterans of the Cold War, and 26 with tours in or around Vietnam. SCHF has grown in sponsorships with one of the biggest coming from MOAACC's Good Deeds Foundation (GDF). For four years in a row GDF has funded Florida Tech ROTC Cadets and PhD Veteran Students in VA sponsored programs. On that night GDF presented a check for \$6400 to cover 8 students from each group to be Guardians on the six flights scheduled through October 2025. Two FIT PhD students were booked on Mission 81.

The SCHF President RADM Jim Hart, USN ret. led the program to prepare for the flight and praised the MOAACC/GDF partnership with SCHF. Many VMC and MOAACC members have taken the flight as honorees and have served as Guardians over the years.


