# VMC President's Report

I hope everyone had a great Christmas and New Years Holidays and some well-deserved time off from the Center.

As we begin 2026, we are faced with a number of uncertainties as to our relationship with the County Parks and Recreation Department. The Amphitheater is still unfinished, mainly because of a delay by Florida Power and Light to run power to the park and the new facilities. The county and Ivey's construction are working on this issue and we are standing by. As I have said in previous updates, we will see some changes in how the Park is managed.

The Brevard Veterans Memorial Center (BVMC) will only have responsibility for the main building and the Plaza; we will have oversite for everything until entering the Park. A new gate will be positioned next to the jeep shed leading into the Park. Another gate will be placed at the Fortenberry entrance to the Park. What has changed is that we will no longer be the organization that is responsible for renting out the park which includes the pavilion, playground, adult workout area, Boy Scout camps, car shows in the park, etc. This will all be managed by Parks and Recreation Central Area.

We have yet to complete our new lease agreement with Parks and Recreation to cover the Amphitheater and the rest of the park improvements. We expect this to be completed by the end of January. The county has not selected a Management Company responsible for managing the Amphitheater, we expect this to happen soon.

With all of that being said, we are looking forward to some big events to take place in the park such as the Key Lime Festival. This event is scheduled for January 17 and is in work with Parks and Recreation. We are also working with the County to continue the JROTC events during February and March. On March 14 we are planning a 5K run and a special event to recognize National Medal of Honor Day. There will be several Medal of Honor recipients expected to attend. Our annual Last Naval Battle of the Revolution will be celebrated on March 21. All of these events and more will be covered in this edition of the Veterans Bulletin.

The December 13 Illumination event sponsored by the Community Advocacy Merritt Island was a success with around three hundred in attendance. We once again erected our Christmas tree in the plaza to open the season for Merritt Island. I would like to give a big thank you to all who volunteered and helped pull it off, especially Charles Schaaf, Bill Pollock and Leslie Sims of CAMI who helped erect the Christmas tree and kept it lit during the holidays.

Another momentous event happened on December 13, 2025. The Navy Midshipmen, near the end of the game and on a 4th and goal scored a touchdown to beat the West Point Black Knights 17-16. With over six minutes left to play the mighty Navy defense held on to deny Army a score and secure a victory. Navy leads the historic series 65-55-7.

I hope you enjoy the fresh look and title of our newsletter, replacing the Council Courier with the Veterans Bulletin. Thanks to Kristi and Sascha Lee for all of their work getting it published.

God bless the USA, our fallen heroes, MIAs, and POWs and God bless our armed forces.

Fifty- eight years ago, this very month, I arrived in Vietnam as a combat Marine. For the next thirteen months, I and a lot of other very young Americans were subjected to things that most folks don't see in a lifetime. We came home and many of us got married and had children. When our children matured, they were sent to the Middle East to be subjected to many of the same horrors that my generation was subjected to. Now, my Grandson has just completed six years in the Marine Corps, he also went overseas and was put in harm's way.

In the 1940s all of my uncles served in the Army and fought in WWII, my aunt was a Major stationed in North Africa as a combat nurse. My Father was a civilian who was one of the original team to produce a working atomic bomb. (He died 20 years after the war ended, after a long-term bout with cancer.)

Every generation since the Revolutionary War has stood up for what was right for America. Freedom of religion, going to Church without threats, owning a gun for recreation and personal protection, and freedom to express an opinion without being shunned or threatened by society.

Today there are certain parts of our country where businesses, Churches and Synagogue, cannot stay open for fear of being robbed, protested or killed. In some cities, one cannot walk down the street without the threat of being harmed.

I wonder what our forefathers would think. George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams and so many other Americans. I remember when we would defend the right of others and have a difference of opinion with mutual respect. We must continue to work to understand and tolerate one another.

## VMC Librarian Report

In January, in keeping with the theme of new beginnings, we commemorate the American Revolution.

We should be mindful that from the opening shots at Lexington Green to the British surrender at Yorktown, six and a half long years of struggle occurred, with the outcome always in doubt. Indeed, during this span, the patriot cause was never more than one crisis away from total defeat. These facts are noted to pay tribute to the courage and vision of those who took up the patriot cause at great personnel risk and remained faithful until the issue was finally decided.

Indeed, even after Yorktown, two more years passed before the final treaty was settled and American independence from the British Empire was formally recognized.

Yet another five years would ensue before the United States as we now know it came into existence, with the ratification of the Constitution. Previously, America was a loose alliance of thirteen tiny countries, which in the absence of a common enemy, fell into constant conflict with one another.

We can count ourselves fortunate that unlike most revolutions, ours never failed but rather left a legacy of progress, sometimes halting and erratic, but progress nonetheless. Even so, it took four years of bloodshed in the Civil War before the evil of slavery and the permanence of the union became settled questions.

As we enter the 250th calendar year of our nation's existence, we the people must continually strive to match our reality to our ideals.

## Book of the Month: *Sacred Duty: A Soldier's Tour at Arlington Cemetery* by Senator Tom Cotton

This book takes the reader on an extraordinary journey behind the scenes of Arlington Cemetery in an inspiring portrait of "The Old Guard," the revered U.S. Army unit whose mission is to honor our country's fallen heroes on the most hallowed ground in America.

The narrative covers various honor ceremonies performed for the country by the U.S. Army. The history of the Old Guard is presented. This unit, officially designated the Third U.S. Infantry Regiment, is based at Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall (formerly Fort Myer) at Arlington Cemetery. Its soldiers are specially selected and highly trained, as described in the book.

Several myths are addressed and refuted. Also discussed are the cemetery's origins as the estate of Robert E. Lee and how it became the final resting place of America's heroes.

Of interest, the first soldier interred at Arlington was Private William Christman of the 67th Pennsylvania. His burial occurred on May 13, 1864.

The last part of the book covers the selection, uniforms, and training of the "Sentinels" or walking guards of the Tomb of the Unknowns.

The author, currently a U.S. Senator representing the state of Arkansas, is a combat veteran of both the Iraq and Afghanistan Wars and served with the Old Guard.

Sacred Duty is an inspiring book. It is designated as MiscM-07 in the Miscellaneous-Monuments Section of the BVMC library.

# Park and Plaza Report

### Getting Close to Grand Opening of the BVMC Park after Improvements Completed

Thirteen months ago, Brevard County Parks and Recreation held the ground breaking ceremony for the fantastic \$8.2M additions to the Brevard Veterans Memorial Park. Prime contractor Ivey Construction, along with many subs, have been doing a great job, just as they did in 2015 and 2016 to build our museum and first phase on the new park. Sadly, FPL is now several weeks behind electric build out and linking into the power grid so the grand opening is temporarily delayed.

To recap, the upgrades include the \$2.4 M Amphitheater, the \$1.3 M Concessions and Restroom Building, creating a major new entrance directly from Fortenberry, 100 new parking spaces, substantial lighting and irrigation, as well as dozens of trees, including the Memorial Live Oaks, and much more. Check out the photos taken on 19 December below. Donors have also purchased 25 weather resistant benches which will go into the park after completion in coordination with the County.

Once the turnover is complete, we expect Brevard County Parks and Recreation will hold a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony, a new management and event booking team will be contracted for, and we can then work with them to also support more than 20 veteran related events including JROTC, Enlistment Ceremony, etc. expected in 2026, just as major acts, concerts, programs, etc. begin to take place by February. The BVMC President Dean Schaaf reframed the mission of the Park Committee to focus on that transition which will meet early in 2026 to begin BVMC's side of the work. Thanks to all on that committee: Donn Weaver (Chair), Jim DesJardins, Billy VanDorn, Doug Bisset, Wayne Freid, Paul Julian, Karen Croft and the supportive BVMC Executive Committee.

On December 10, the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center was proud to host a special ceremony honoring Mildred "Midge" Stingley, a true member of the Greatest Generation and a World War II "Rosie the Riveter."

During the ceremony, we recognized Midge's vital contribution to the war effort as she worked at the Alcoa Aluminum Plant in Lafayette, Indiana, from April through August of 1945, helping to produce critical materials that supported American troops overseas. Her service represents the strength, determination, and patriotism of the millions of women who stepped forward on the home front when the nation needed them most.

Pastor Monty Trammel of NorthPoint Baptist Church, along with many members of his congregation, joined us for this meaningful occasion. Following the presentation, BVMC President Dean Schaaf presented Midge with a commemorative plaque in front of the BVMC membership in attendance, marking the moment with heartfelt appreciation and applause.

## Joint SAR/GDF Mission Completed – America 250 Flags in All High Schools

As of mid-December, all public and private high schools in Brevard County were provided America 250 Flags, with many already flying. As best is known, this is the first county in Florida and perhaps the continental US to have done such a project. Hawaii gave such flags to all JROTC programs earlier this year, sparking us to take action here.

The project involved purchasing 44 flags for about \$1,700 by two organizations - the Brevard Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and MOAACC's Good Deeds Foundation. Home based at the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center, where the flag also flies, the project is designed to encourage youth to understand more about our country. The Capstone of the effort was a flag raising at Brevard Public Schools in Viera on 9 December when Superintendent Dr. Mark Rendell was presented a flag and helped raise it there. In addition to the schools, all 14 JROTC programs in the county received their own flag.

# Store Updates & Military Dog Tags

So, do you know the real story about Military Dog Tags? They are not for your dogs as, unfortunately, I have had children say when they are given complimentary ones after visiting the museum.

During the Civil War, soldiers created unofficial tags by pinning paper notes to uniforms, stenciling knapsacks or wearing engraved metal discs purchased from traveling vendors. Approximately 42% of Union soldiers that died were unidentified.

In 1906, the US Army issued a general order requiring an aluminum half dollar size circular tag to be worn by all soldiers. In 1916 regulations changed to require two tags. One was to remain with the fallen soldier's body and the other collected for records and burial. By 1917 all US combat troops were required to wear tags which now include unique serial numbers. The Navy used a sailor's etched fingerprint on the back.

In 1940 the shape was changed to the current one. Most WWII tags had a notch at one end and were believed to be for jamming into a fallen soldier's teeth. But that was false and its true purpose was to align the tag into a machine to imprint on medical forms. Tags began to include blood types and Tetanus shot dates. During the Vietnam era the tag was placed on boot laces as a backup in case of severe trauma.

After using social security numbers for 45 years, the military transitioned to using a 10-digit Department of Defense number to protect against identity theft. Draftees in WWII and earlier may have coined the term for the tags as a cynical term, as being treated "like dogs".

# Wreaths Across America 2025: Honor, Remember and Teach Rises to New Heights at CCNC

On a beautiful December Saturday Morning, for the eighth year since it opened, Wreaths Across America (WAA) led a moving ceremony at the Cape Canaveral National Cemetery. WAA also made sure a record 11,000 wreaths were available to cover every in-ground grave site.

WAA/CCNC was led this year by a new volunteer, Marine Veteran Ruth Osborne as location coordinator with Katie Beauseigneur, a longtime CCNC WAA Section lead as Assistant and Army Veteran CPT Donn Weaver as Deputy. This year plans were made to have the wreaths arrive the day before and thus create more than 5 hours when family and friends could personally place wreaths on their loved ones' graves. Over the two days an estimated 2,800 people visited including more than 400 volunteers, who placed wreaths one by one on all the other graves before the 1100 am Ceremony.
