President's Report

As you read this Bulletin, I am on vacation in Allen (Dallas), TX visiting our daughter, Ashley, and our two granddaughters, Penny and Piper. We will celebrate Penny's 13th birthday on July 31. I will rerun the next paragraph in case you missed it last month:

I want everyone to know that I will not be running for President this year. I have been your president for ten years and have been involved with the BVMC in one way or another for 30 years. I have dedicated a great deal of time and effort to making the Memorial Center what it is today, but I could not have done it without all the help of the elected officers and our great volunteers, thank you. I am not going anywhere except for a few trips to visit family and to take some cruises. I will continue on the BOD as Past President and will always be available to find the hidden bones.

We had a great July 4th, our great nation's 250th birthday. Following our usual July 4th parade on Merritt Island (I had our mascot eagle, Freedom, in the back of my truck, this year with an "eaglet" in his tricorn hat). We also flew the "250 flag" and had many walkers handing out small flags and invitations to our event following the parade at the amphitheater.

The Sons of the American Revolution color guard presented the colors, all in period uniforms. Well done SAR! Following a dramatic introduction by our President, Commander Brian Purvis, Executive Officer of the Navy Ordnance Test Unit (NOTU) delivered the keynote speech with a memorial history of our remarkable Navy, Marine Corps, Washington's Army/Militia, and the forerunner to the Coast Guard, the "Revenue Cutters." CDR Purvis' fifteen minute speech covered our military history from the revolutionary war to the modern day challenges in a very precise manner. His insightful comments should be required reading in our schools. As we say in the Navy, Bravo Zulu!

CDR Purvis' comments were followed by the President of the local chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, retired US Army Colonel, Hans Hunt. Col Hunt covered his ancestry linking him with his ancestors during the revolutionary war period. Amazing!

Speaking of the US Coast Guard, the revenue cutters mentioned earlier were a direct precursor to the modern USCG. Established in 1790 by Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton, the US Revenue Cutter Service later merged with the US Life-Saving Service in 1915 to officially form the United States Coast Guard (USCG).

The Navy League Cape Canaveral Chapter is sponsoring a dinner celebration of the USCG's 236th birthday at the Indian River Colony Club on Saturday, August 8. The event runs from 1730-2000 with the guest speaker being CAPT Jason Aleksak, Commander, Sector Jacksonville. If you are interested in attending, see Dean Schaaf for further information. The Coast Guard station is holding an open house on the station from 10:00-1400 on Tuesday August 4. The VMC will be there with our canopy to represent the BVMC.

The Military Order of the Purple Heart will be having their annual recognition ceremony at the BVMC Museum from 1400-1600 on Sunday, August 9. There will be special recognition for ten Purple Heart recipients, with 8" bricks placed in the plaza. Quilts of Valor will also present quilts to the honorees.

Book of the Month: *Bucher: My Story* by Lloyd Bucher and Mark Rascovich

Commander Lloyd Bucher is famous- or notorious- for having been the captain of the spy ship USS Pueblo. Seized by the North Koreans in January 1968, it remains the only ship of the U.S. Navy in captivity anywhere in the world. After eleven months of incarceration and abuse, Bucher and his crew were released near the end of the year. Shortly after repatriation, the Navy held a court of inquiry that recommended Bucher be court-martialed for surrendering his ship. The Secretary of the Navy overturned this finding. The court-martial never took place.

In this autobiography, Bucher recounts what could be a great American success story: Orphan on the verge of homelessness gains entry to Boys Town, finds direction, eventually joins the Navy, accrues sufficient funds to complete college, earns a commission as a Navy officer and rises to command a ship. A few minutes under fire in the frigid waters off the east coast of Korea radically altered this trajectory.

The Pueblo was an 177-foot converted light cargo ship of WWII vintage. She had been part of the "mothball" fleet for 12 years before being recommissioned as an "environmental research ship," a cover designation for her real mission as an intelligence collector. She was minimally armed with .50 cal machine guns in exposed mounts. In fact, Bucher had been instructed to keep these weapons unmanned and under cover so as to appear unthreatening. These measures to camouflage the Pueblo's true nature fooled very few people.

After discussing the outfitting, trans-Pacific deployment and initial operation of the Pueblo, Bucher describes his decisions on the day of the capture and then the brutality of the North Koreans during the eleven-month ordeal. He concludes with the board of inquiry.

Bucher's defense of his actions rests on three points:

- He was not provided with adequate means of destroying classified documents and equipment, and his prior expressed concerns on this vulnerability were disregarded.
- He was not provided with adequate means to defend against a concerted attack, because such a situation was deemed impossible by higher authority.
- His distress messages that his ship was under attack were ignored.

This book challenges the reader to consider his or her own actions if placed in such a predicament. The result is uncomfortable but hopefully insightful.

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American Boating Club Cocoa Beach

In celebration of the nation's 250th birthday, the United States flag has been proudly displayed throughout the country.

The United States Power Squadrons, doing business as America's Boating Club, is honored to have a nationally recognized flag known as the Ensign, as shown below.



The founder of USPS, Roger Upton, and navigator Charles Chapman designed the flag, which was patented in 1915 and adopted as the official flag of the organization. The Ensign has the recognized dignity of yacht ensigns and can be flown in place of the U.S. flag on boats captained by members of the organization while navigating in domestic waters.

The Ensign has been displayed at many notable events over its long history. Before World War I, Assistant Secretary of the Navy Franklin D. Roosevelt visited Roger Upton's boat and viewed the organization as a U.S. Navy auxiliary, with club boats conducting maneuvers with naval vessels. In recognition of the organization's educational programs, many future naval officers were trained by USPS instructors during both World War I and World War II.

An artist's rendering of the USPS boats conducting drills with U.S. naval vessels prior to World War I is on display in the Hall of Flags at the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center (BVMC). An official Ensign can also be found there.

More recently, the Ensign, along with the Cocoa Beach burgee, was aboard the Apollo 13 expedition. The Ensign is on display at the national headquarters in Raleigh, North Carolina, while the burgee can be seen on the second floor of the BVMC museum.

While all boaters proudly display the U.S. flag from the stern of their boats, members of America's Boating Club are also proud to fly their official Ensign, symbolizing both their love of country and their commitment to safe boating.

We recently got two military belt buckles, one Army and one Coast Guard that are beautiful. They are made by the Bergamot Brass works and are highly collectible vintage accessories known for their 3D sculpted realism, heavy weight and vibrant details.

Founded in Delavan, Wisconsin, the Bergamot Brass Works was a pioneering commercial maker of modern art-cast buckles starting in the early 1970s. Throughout the late 70s, 80s and early 90s they produced an extensive line of patriotic and military-themed buckles representing all major branches of the US Armed Forces. Bergamot's military line typically features deep relief imagery, military slogans inscribed on the back. We are fortunate to have the US Army one with the M60 Patton tank and the text celebrating "Army, its machines and men, steel and pride" Model K-32 and also the US Coast Guard belt buckle features helicopters, ships, anchors and the service emblem. Come on in and check them out. We have many other unique items also.

We would love to have you visit and pick up a new hat or item to show your allegiance to your chosen military service or for some loved one. While you are here, think about becoming a volunteer. We are looking for some enthusiastic folks who enjoy talking to the public about their service time and getting to know more about the over 5000 artifacts that we have. Hours are 10 to 1 or 1 to 4 and we will train you. It is a very fun place to volunteer and meet great people. Hope to see you soon.

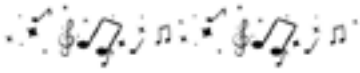
